The IU Simon Cancer Center will collect blood samples for the Indiana University Cancer Biomarker Study (IU-CABS) during the Indiana Black Expo's INShape Indiana Black & Minority Health Fair from Thursday, July 15 to Sunday, July 18.

IU-CABS will be located in booths 313, 315, 317 and 319 in Hall D of the Indiana Convention Center. The booths are open from 1 to 8 p.m. Friday, July 16; 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., Saturday, July 17; and noon to 6 p.m. Sunday, July 18.

Donors will be eligible for the Indiana State Department of Health's One Stop-One Stick program, which allows people to donate blood and receive free screenings of their choice.

Men and women with and without cancer may indicate they want their blood samples to be included IU-CABS. The study will help identify genetic and environmental risk factors that lead to the development of cancer. Minorities have historically been underrepresented in cancer prevention, diagnosis and treatment studies.

This weekend, Saturday, July 17, and Sunday, July 18, *Sound Medicine* host Barbara Lewis and guests will discuss health care costs, treating vision loss from diabetes and the epidemic of drug addiction.

Ryan Thompson, MD, an internist in Boston, will explain a course he designed and teaches at Harvard Medical School that helps new doctors understand the cost of care they are prescribing.

Nominate a 2010 Riley Champion

Riley Children's Foundation launched Riley Champions two years ago to honor Riley Hospital for Children patients who have inspired communities with their courage and commitment to help others, despite facing difficult medical challenges. Translational research training program

The Clinical Investigator and Translational Education (CITE) Program is a special program for physicians, nurses, dentists, doctoral and postdoctoral scientists interested in more formal training in clinical and translational research. The program has recently been restructured using funding from the National Institutes of Health through the Clinical Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI).

The CITE Program has been structured in order to permit enrollees to integrate formal research training into a fellowship or faculty position within their own department. Approximately six credit hours per semester will be taken along with clinical research in the participant's discipline.

As part of the CITE Program, participants receive a master of science in clinical research degree through the Indiana University Graduate School. A second option is to take fewer courses and not the research requirement, leading to a graduate certificate in clinical research. Finally, individuals may simply take a course or two that may be relevant to their interests.

Intercultural communication courses

The Office of Faculty Affairs and Professional Development American English for Internationals (AEI) program will offer two courses in Effective Intercultural Communication for Healthcare Professionals this fall. These courses are designed for international professionals desiring to be more effective communicators.

- Accent Modification will be offered from 5 to 7 p.m. Thursdays, Aug. 5 to Sept. 23, in Methodist Hospital, Candlelight Room, A3050-A, with follow-up workshops scheduled Thursday, Nov. 18; Jan. 13, 2011 and March 17, 2011. This eight-week course, taught by experienced speech language pathologist specialized in accent modification, will provide participations greater awareness of the unique features of American English pronunciation patterns and accent, and how to modify an accent to more closely approximate the speech of native speakers of American English.
- Conversational English will be offered from 5 to 7 p.m. Tuesdays, Aug. 17 to Oct. 5, in Methodist Hospital, Candlelight Room, A3050-A, with follow-up sessions scheduled Tuesday, Nov. 10; Jan. 25, 2011 and April 5, 2011. This eight week course, taught by a trained linguist and experienced teacher of English as a Second Language, will provide participants greater knowledge of some of the key elements of conversational skills, including the importance of cultural awareness, and a chance to practice these skills to become more effective communicators in both professional and social settings.

The cost for each course is \$280 for IU/Clarian staff and \$320 for non IU/Clarian staff. Scholarships are available for medical students and observers on an individual basis. Support provided by the IUPUI Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.
