Anthropologist to speak on Afghanistan crisis

Dr. Louis Dupree, an anthropologist who has lived in Afghanistan for nearly 30 years and who was detained and interrogated as a suspected CIA agent before being expelled from that country, will speak on "Current Developments in Afghanistan" today (Wednesday) at IUPUI.

His first appearance will be in the Lilly Room of the Union Building, 12:50-2 p.m. (Lunch is available from the cafeteria or may be brought in by participants.) From 3-4 p.m., Dupree will speak and answer questions in Cavanaugh Hall, Room 117.

Dupree first went to Afghanistan in 1949 under the auspices of the American Museum of Natural History. In 1961 he conducted archaeological work in Iran for the University of Pennsylvania.

Dupree, who returned to the United States from Pakistan in June, lived near the Afghanistan

border after his expulsion from Afghanistan in 1978.

In a series of papers written for the American Universities Field Staff (AUFS), the American scholar detailed the military and civil strife, the political upheaval and the government purges in Afghanistan prior to the Russian invasion in December of 1979.

Because IU is one of 10 institutional members of AUFS which supports scholars and researchers abroad, Dupree was asked during his interrogation by Afghan officials about his acquaintance with Afghan scholars who attended IU.

Dupree wrote of being confronted with an Afghan man who had been so severely tortured that Dupree recognized the Afghan only by the coat that he had purchased while a student in Bloomington.

The former student, under tor-

ture, "confessed" that Dupree was a CIA agent. The man, however, was in such poor physical condition that he babbled incoherently as he was led away.

"The one interrogator left behind asked: 'Well what do you say to that?' 'What can I say? He's been tortured so badly, and all the poor man did was repeat the folklores of the foreign community.' The interrogator left. I wept."

Because, as a scholar, Dupree was more interested in his research than in joining in the local social scene, many members of the foreign community in Kabul did not understand what he did, and assumed he worked for the CIA.

Dupree's visit to IUPUI is sponsored by the Office of International Programs, the Department of Political Science and the Central Indiana Council on World Affairs. His appearances are open to the public.

ICFAR moves, expands

The Engineering and Research Division of ICFAR, formerly the Fluid Dynamics Laboratories at 909 W. New York, will be moving to 611 N. Capital to allow for the future growth of the facilities.

The Division will begin moving Friday, Oct. 3, and the old Fluid Dynamics Laboratories building will be torn down to make way for the physical education complex under construction at the corner of Lake and New York Street.

According to Dr. Robert Henderson, president of the Indianapolis Center for Advanced Research (ICFAR), the move is part of the Center's five-year plan for expansion.

Founded in 1970 through the combined effort of city government, industry and IUPUI, the Center is governed by a 12-member board of directors and guided by a three-point philosophy of academic research, cultural value and commercial application. Since 1973 the

Center has supported itself with fund-raising and commercially successful inventions.

The first five-year plan became effective in 1973 when ICFAR began to develop the Ultrasound Research Division (URD). URD has accomplished some notable achievements, including a hand held ultrasound scanner which provides a visual display of an active heart.

Another hand held scanner developed by URD is the Breast Scanning early detection system now in use at the Regenstrief Clinic.

Other divisions within ICFAR are:

- Aerospace Research Applications Center (ARAC), specializing in problem solving and analysis in science and engineering for public and private industry.

- Energy Engineering and Research Division (EERD), an interdisciplinary science concentrating its effort toward the solution of problems in energy, environment and transportation.

- Fortune-Fry Laboratories at University Hospital, also using ultrasound techniques while conducting extensive medical research.

Dr. Henderson explains many members of the Center's research staff also hold faculty appointments at IUPUI.

"We also employ a number of students at the Center and have a lot of communication with people at the student level," adds Henderson.

Commenting on the future of ICFAR and the new, five-year plan, Dr. Henderson says: "I feel we are very much involved in both the city and campus community. Part of the thrust of the new, five-year plan is our Industrial Liaison Office, which is involved in job creation through the development of new businesses.

"This is a program we are pushing at the present time. ICFAR is an inherent part in the way Indianapolis can move forward in the 80s," concludes Henderson.

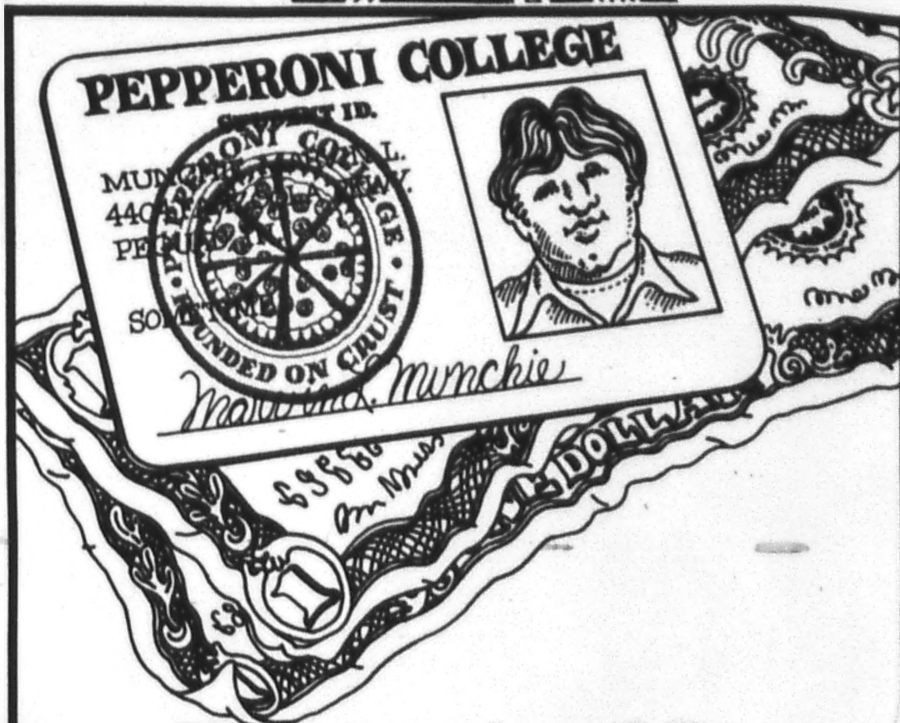
IU-B Basketball Season Tickets

Baseball Metros 4-0

As of a doubleheader win against IUPUI-Ft. Wayne Sept. 20, Coach Bob Bunnell and his Baseball Metros are sporting a 4-0 win-loss record this fall.

"I'm really pleased at this point," says Bunnell. "The hitting is much better than I had anticipated."

To date, the team boasts a .327 collective batting average. According to Bunnell, the defense has tightened up, and the pitching has improved by leaps and bounds.

Against the Ft. Wayne club, the IUPUI hurlers struck out nine, walked four and allowed only 10 hits. The home-team Metros came from behind in the leadoff game 5-3 and trounced the Mastadons 10-2 in the night-cap.

The first game was scoreless

until Ft. Wayne went on top 2-0 in the third inning. The Metros scrambled back in the fourth. With two out, Steve Dixon slammed a triple.

Next up, Dave Decker hit the ball back to the pitcher. However, the pitcher overthrew first base, and Dixon scored on the error.

The Mastadons added another run for a 3-1 count, but Bunnell's crew rallied in the bottom of the fifth. Mike Quinlan, Ralph Skaggs and Cliff Kelly all singled to fill the bases. Terry Doris then grounded to the third baseman, who threw the ball past the catcher in the attempt to nab Quinlan at the plate.

Both Quinlan and Skaggs came in on the miscue, and Doris was safe at first. Dixon walked

Elton John pounds piano

Elton John
(Market Square Arena)

The crowd cheered, not fought, as Elton John pounded the keyboards and belted out old and new songs to a surprisingly empty Market Square Arena, Saturday, Sept. 27. Though contacts have long since replaced the extravagant glasses which were his trademark, he still sported all the zest and showmanship that he displayed in his '76 MSA appearance (and even more hair).

John maintained a reasonable balance between new and old material. Since his last two albums are most popular in Europe and receive little air play on this side of the Atlantic, the demand was for his older music. Fortunately, the scales of the concert selection tipped in that direction.

Being more of a pop artist than a heavy rock 'n' roller, he more than demonstrated his ability to warm the keyboards of his majestic white grand piano and fill the corners of the arena with clear and solid vocals. He easily outdid many so-called rock 'n' roll groups at their own style. John is capable of singing a rocking song with a driving beat and screaming guitars, and still be clearly heard through the other instruments.

The opening number, "Funeral For a Friend/Love Lies Bleeding," best exemplifies the magical and mystical qualities of the music. A surprising lack of feeling throughout the concert was one of the two imperfections in the show. The other problem lay in the fact that, at times, some of the instruments could not be heard

through all the other parts of the music.

The volume level was excellent. This was clearly visible when the lead guitarist embarked on a solo high on the neck of the guitar. Every finger movement was coordinated with the sound coming from the suspended speaker system.

John mounted the stage in an orange one-piece outfit and matching hat, which were both covered with black and silver lightning bolts. For the first few songs, he gave his total concentration to the music. Then he began to loosen up and turn to the crowd. His antics at the ivory included constantly throwing his bench around, placing his foot on the top of the piano, and jumping up and down and throwing his legs out without missing a beat. In his calmer moments, he would simply look bug-eyed out into the audience.

John's band, Guided Muscle (which includes Nigel Olsson and Dee Murray, both familiar backups for John), rocked through old numbers such as "Saturday Night's All Right For Fighting," "Philadelphia Freedom," "All the Young Girls Love Alice" and "Bite Your Lip, Get Up and Dance." They eased back on the mellow, but still solid favorites like "Rocket Man," "Someone Saved My Life Tonight," "Harmony" (a rarity in concert), "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" and "Your Song."

From his newer albums, John drew on such music as "Sartorial Eloquence" and "White Power." Those and other songs off his more recent albums were unfamiliar to the crowd because of where his popularity rests these days.

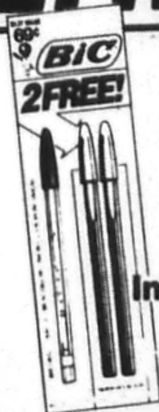

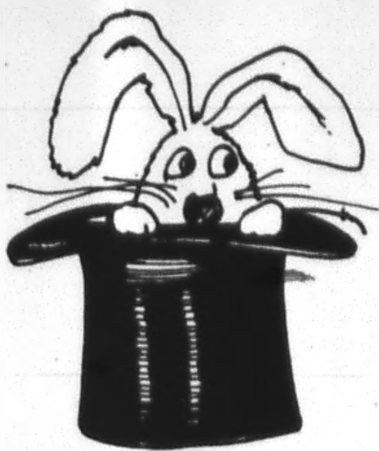

IUPUI's Doris turned the tables, knocking his first homerun of the day over the centerfield fence to start off the third inning. With the score knotted at 2-2, Dixon and Terry York both singled, and Larry Lineback walked, loading the bases with nobody out.

Stephenson slapped his second hit of the day, singling in Dixon and York and sending Lineback to third. Lineback came home on another wild

pitch to put the IUPUIers out in front to stay, 5-2.

The home team heaped on four more runs in the fourth. Stephenson walked; Jeff Werden singled, and Kelly cleaned them off the sacks with a triple. Skaggs drew another walk and stole second.

However, while Skaggs was going to second, the catcher picked Kelly off at third. Doris then stepped to the plate and hit another homerun to end Metro scoring for the inning.

The Metros picked up their final run of the day in the fifth when York walked, went to second on a passed ball and came in on a Lineback single.

Aside from their second inning fireworks, the visiting Mastadons could only salvage three scattered singles off the Metro pitching. Winner and starter Tom Davis gave up four hits and struck out three before Sean Corrigan relieved him in the fifth. Corrigan chalked up a one-hit performance while fanning four.

Following Saturday's bout with Purdue-North Central and the marathon try on Sunday, the Baseball Metros close out their autumn season against Wabash Valley J. C. Friday, Oct. 3, at 2 p.m. at the North Central High School field.
