Services also include consultation to the campus community and training experiences for graduate student counselors.

Annual highlights

• Best practices

- Approximately 87% of clients completing the CAPS satisfaction survey were satisfied with the services received and 80% reported significant improvements in the concerns that brought them to counseling.
- All full-time staff completed requirements for licensure to practice independently. Currently, CAPS has 5.6 FTE clinical staff and 0.2 FTE psychiatrist, with a goal of ~15.

• Teaching and learning

- When comparing first-time full-time students over an 8-year period, those accessing CAPS' services had a 6-year graduation rate of ~42%, compared to a 27% graduation rate for their peer group.
- CAPS provided services to nearly 800 students (a 5.6% increase over prior year) for nearly 4500 counseling or assessment sessions (16.5% increase over prior year).
- Civic engagement
 - Staff presented as part of continuing education workshop for professionals on working with GLB clients.
 - Staff made presentation to local PFLAG group regarding the coming out process.
- Diversity
 - More than 25% percent of students seeking CAPS' services identified as non-white.
 - Staff completed ~75 evaluations for possible learning disorders or ADHD.

Diagnoses of Treatment: Of the 356 clients that engaged in evaluation or treatment for a sufficient amount of time to support a diagnosis, the most frequent symptom presentation was related to clinical depression. Some clients met criteria for more than one diagnosis, therefore, the column sum is >356.

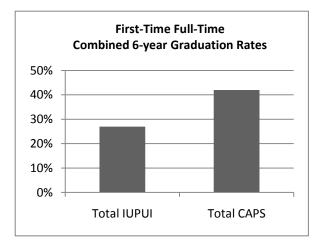

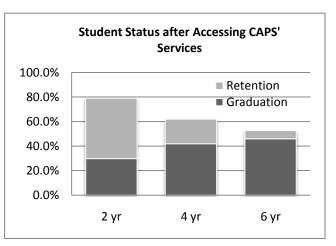
Client Satisfaction (2009-10): Clients report satisfaction with CAPS' services and believe accessing these services contributed to academic success.

Clients surveyed:	N=189
found the visits useful	89%
experienced improvement in their condition	80%
indicated that CAPS' services helped them to remain at IUPUI	49%
believed CAPS' services helped to improve their academic performance	54%

Impact on Student Success: Students accessing CAPS' services are more likely to persist and graduate compared to their peers.



First-time full-time students accessing CAPS services had a 6-year graduation rate ~50% greater than their peer group.



Nearly 80% of students seeking CAPS' services remain enrolled two years later.
