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## WOMEN'S CENTER TO OPEN FRIDAY

Musicians, an art display, refreshments and women clad as historic figures in the feminist movement will be on hand Friday (September 19) for the gala opening of the IUPUI Continuing Education Center for Women (CECW).

I.U. Vice-President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr. will officially open the center, a remodeled two-story building at 1301 East 38th Street. All IUPUI faculty and staff are invited to the open house which will be held from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. and the public is invited to visit the center September 22-26.

The center, culmination of six years' planning, will provide a home-like atmosphere where women can come for career and education counseling and for continuing education classes, as well as a meeting place for women's groups. The building has three classrooms, two offices for counseling services and a lounge-reception area.

As a program of the IUPUI Division of Continuing Education, the center was developed and is supervised by its director, Marjorie P. Leamson.

Maureen Prevost, who holds a master of social work degree from I.U., has been co-ordinator of the center since last January. Previously she was a psychiatric social worker and administrator of special programs for the disadvantaged.

Vicki Tashjian, CECW special programs co-ordinator, has a master's degree in counseling and guidance from Ohio State University. Her background includes public school teaching and leading workshops in assertiveness and life-planning.

The CECW will offer career and educational programs, personal development programs and courses, skills-building programs such as management techniques for women and a professional development seminar for secretaries, plus a talent bank in co-operation with the new Mayor's Metropolitan Office for Women's Programs.

Except for a few grants for individual programs, the CECW is self-supporting. Counseling is provided without charge. Costs for courses vary according to their length and expenses incurred.

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## "PROTEST" EXHIBITION AT HERRON

"Contemporary Graphic Protest and the Grand Tradition," an exhibition representing 40 artists and the art of protest, will open Friday (September 19) with a reception from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. in the gallery at the Herron School of Art.

Composed of forceful, relevant images reflecting a wide range of graphic styles and techniques, the prints convey a variety of approaches to the art of protest.

Among the artists represented are Rico Lebrun, Ben Shahn, Leon Golub, Robert Rauschenberg and Antonio Frasconi. Depicting protest in the tradition of printmaking are works by Goya, Rowlandson, Hogarth, Bosch, Daumier, Millet and Kollwitz.

First presented in New York in 1974, the exhibition was assembled under the direction of Ralph Shikes, author of *The Indignant Eye*. The show is organized and circulated by the Pratt Graphics Center in New York City, a nonprofit workshop and gallery devoted to original prints and printmaking.

All interested persons are invited to the opening of the exhibition which will continue through October 6 in the gallery, Mondays through Fridays from noon to 5 p.m.
