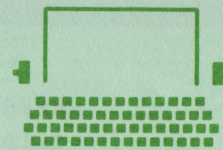

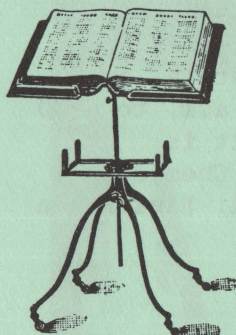

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## DR. BLOOM TO RECEIVE BEERING AWARD



This year's recipient of the Steven C. Beering Award for Advancement in Medical Science is Dr. Floyd Bloom, director of the Division of Preclinical Neuroscience and Endocrinology at the Scripps Clinic and Research Foundation in La Jolla, Calif. He is also scientific director of a National Alcohol Research Center that brings together the faculty from Scripps, the Salk Institute and the University of California, San Diego in a large interdisciplinary research program. Dr. Bloom will be at the Medical Center Nov. 13 to receive the award and to present this year's lecture, "Neuroscience in Medicine: Converging Clinical Implications." The lecture will be given at 8:30 a.m. in the auditorium on the third floor of Emerson Hall; the award will be presented at the close of the lecture. All are invited. While at IU, Dr. Bloom will also meet with other scientists, researchers and physicians. He will make a presentation on "Neuropeptides: Sources of Molecular Diversity" to the Indianapolis Chapter of the Society for Neuroscience Nov. 12 and address freshman and sophomore medical students that day from 11 a.m. to noon.
