The Trustees of Indiana University have named the soon-to-open Research III in honor of Joseph E. Walther, M.D.

Dr. Walther was a prominent Indiana physician and a friend of the School. His foundation, the Walther Cancer Foundation, has contributed \$50 million to support cancer programs at IU over a period of 20 years.

Investigators will begin moving into Joseph E. Walther Hall the first week of April. The IU School of Medicine will formally salute Dr. Walther's support at the dedication of the building on Oct. 8.

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Primary care policy expert to speak at Family Medicine programs

Internationally known primary care physician, health services researcher and author Barbara Starfield, MD, MPH, will speak at IUSM Wednesday, April 8, and Thursday, April 9, as a guest of the IUSM Department of Family Medicine.

On April 8, Dr. Starfield will present "Primary Care: The Imperative for Health Care Reform" during the Family Medicine Grand Rounds from noon to 1 p.m. in the IU School of Nursing Building auditorium. In this talk, Dr. Starfield will present evidence indicating that countries oriented to primary care achieve better health at lower costs and with greater equity. All members of the IUSM and IUPUI community are invited to attend.

On April 9, she will speak with the Family Medicine Student Interest Group and other interested students in an open conversation from noon to 1 p.m. in the VanNuys Medical Science Building Daly Center, room 185. Lunch will be provided.

Dr. Starfield is a University Distinguished Professor in the Departments of Health Policy and Management and Pediatrics at the Johns Hopkins University Schools of Public Health and Medicine. She is the author of *Primary Care: Concept, Evaluation, and Policy and Primary Care: Balancing Health Needs, Services, and Technology*, which are recognized as seminal works in the field. Dr. Starfield is a member of the Institute of Medicine, and is a leading source of evidence that primary care produces better health outcomes, lowers overall costs and creates greater equity in health in the population. 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IUSM Annual Education Retreat

Based on the positive response to last year's retreat focused on "The Basic Scientist as Medical Educator" and as we move toward more integrated teaching of the basic and clinical sciences, we plan for both basic scientists and clinicians to come and participate in the Stanford Faculty Development Center (SFDC) course on medical teaching this year. This course was developed by Kelley Skeff, MD, PhD, and Georgette Stratos, PhD over 20 years ago at Stanford University. The course has now been taught internationally to both basic scientists and clinicians.

The purpose of the course is to introduce teachers to an educational framework that allows them to analyze and improve their own teaching and to allow for a forum for an exchange among educators about what has worked for them in their own settings.

In order to provide an even broader forum for this collegial exchange, basic science and clinical educators will take part in both the large group and small group sessions together to facilitate discussions that will focus us on the core principles of all the competencies, including competency III - scientific knowledge. Also, methods for active student learning will be discussed.

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This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, March 15, to *Sound Medicine*, the award-winning weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week, Naeem Ali, MD, assistant professor of pulmonary, allergy, critical care and sleep medicine at Ohio State University College of Medicine, will discuss his study results on prolonged stays in the intensive care unit and what can be done to mitigate the effects of heavy sedation and use of respirators.

Thomas Gerber, MD, PhD, associate professor of radiology and medicine at the Mayo Clinic, will explain the American Heart Association's recommendation to limit the use of CT scans to prevent overexposure to radiation.

Indiana University psychologist Edward Hirt, PhD, will explain self-sabotage and whether it is a deliberate action or mental or behavioral disorder.

John Raglin, PhD, a psychologist in the IU Department of Kinesiology, will discuss how light to moderate exercise can elevate a person's mood for several hours afterwards.

In this week's *Sound Medicine* "Checkup," Jeremy Shere will explore "diet betting," betting real money to see who can lose the most weight.
