## IU Center for Bioethics and Moi University offer new master's degree

A new partnership between the Indiana University and Kenya's Moi University will develop master's degrees at both universities that focus on ethical issues in international health research.

The program, funded with a \$940,000 award from the National Institutes of Health Fogarty International Center, will create the Indiana University-Moi University Academic Research Ethics Partnership.

The partnership builds on the 20-year relationship between the Indiana University School of Medicine and Moi University School of Medicine in the East African city of Eldoret, Kenya, which began as a way to provide training to medical students and health-care providers from both universities.

## When the need arises, IUSM weather closings online

The weather outside isn't frightful, but when it takes a turn, check medicine.iu.edu/weatherAdvisory for the IUSM adverse weather advisory. The IUPUI adverse weather policy can be found at <a href="https://www.indiana.edu/~uhrs/policies/nonunion/8.0/8.3.html">www.indiana.edu/~uhrs/policies/nonunion/8.0/8.3.html</a>.

The university generally does not close because of adverse weather. When the campus remains open during adverse weather, employees are expected to use their best judgment if adverse weather creates extreme travel hazards for commuting to and from the workplace.

Be aware, however, that the cancellation of classes does not necessarily mean the campus is closed. Closing the campus is a specific action of the Chancellor separate from the decision to cancel classes. Faculty and staff are advised to listen carefully to Indianapolis metropolitan area radio and television stations regarding cancellations and campus closings and to verify this information on the campus webpage, <a href="https://www.iupui.edu">www.iupui.edu</a>.

In addition, IU has an emergency notification system (IU Notify) that permits messages to be sent as voice or text message to cell, home and office phones and university and non-university email accounts. To receive notification of class cancellations and campus closings via phone and email, employees must update their emergency contact information through OneStart at <a href="https://www.onestart.iu.edu">www.onestart.iu.edu</a>. Select the "notifications" tab and follow the links.

There are some jobs which require employees to work during campus closings. Check with your supervisor and, in the case of medical students and personnel, check the IUSM adverse weather web site.

## IUSCC seeks proposals for ACS grants

The IU Simon Cancer Center is pleased to announce the availability of funds for new pilot projects to assist new investigators who hold the rank of assistant professor, research assistant professor, or assistant scientist. These funds are from the American Cancer Society Institutional Research Grant.

This grant provides support for beginning investigators to enable them to initiate their independent research program. Funds are available for 4-5 pilot projects in amounts up to \$25,000. Special funds also are available for one pilot study in the amount of \$30,000 within the special topic of cancer disparities focused on underserved populations.

The deadline for application submission for American Cancer Society Institutional Research Grant pilot study funding is **Monday**, **Jan. 5**. Application guidelines and forms may be obtained from:

The purpose of the ACSIRG program is to attract new investigators from Indiana University into cancer research and to provide support for new pilot studies that will provide preliminary data for the investigator to develop into studies that will compete successfully for external, national funds from both federal and private sources. Faculty from the IUSM and its regional campuses, the IU schools of nursing, dentistry, optometry, public and environmental affairs, health and rehabilitation sciences, liberal arts, law, science, and informatics are encouraged to apply.

**Eligibility:** Applications are invited from faculty with ranks of assistant professor, research assistant professor, or assistant scientist. Proposals must describe new pilot studies in cancer research. ACS guidelines specify that applicants with prior funding from the ACSIRG or with significant funding from other sources are not eligible to apply. Applicants must beU.S. citizens, or submit proof of approval for a green card. Applications from research assistant professors and assistant scientists require a letter from the department chair certifying that the research proposal is independent of the research program of the laboratory P.I.

The funding period will be Feb. 1, 2009, through Jan. 31, 2010.

The body of the proposal must not exceed 6 pages. Appendices may not be more than 4 pages. Proposals must follow formatting guidelines of fonts of Helvetica or Arial, font size 11 point or larger, and ½ inch margins. An electronic copy in .pdf format should be submitted to Elizabeth Parsons, grants coordinator, at <a href="mailto:eparsons@iupui.edu">eparsons@iupui.edu</a>.

Proposals which exceed the page numbers or fail to follow the formatting guidelines will be returned to the investigator without review.

#### This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 23, to *Sound Medicine*, the award-winning weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This weekend, Dr. Robert Scott, Rotary International Foundation Trustee chairman, will discuss how the organization, in collaboration with the Bill Gates Foundation and other groups, is working to eradicate polio around the world.

Sound Medicine's Ora Pescovitz, MD, will discuss the recent controversy over BPA (Bisphenol A) in food containers and baby bottles. Dr. Pescovitz will provide some suggestions for parents worried about the chemical effects.

Adolfo Correa, MD, PhD, a medical epidemiologist at the National Center on Birth Defects and Developmental Disabilities and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, will explain his recent study showing a link between mothers with diabetes and the increased risked of birth defects.
