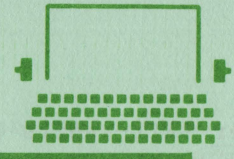


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## NOBEL WINNER MULLER TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS

**J**ames Muller, co-founder of the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear Warfare, will speak here Tuesday, Dec. 3 at noon in the Emerson Hall Auditorium. He was recently awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his work with the group. The Harvard University doctor will discuss issues regarding the opportunities and responsibilities of health professionals in public health issues--such as nuclear war. The subject of his speech is "Physicians, Nuclear War and the Nobel Peace Prize." All are welcome.

## PHYSICIANS TEST DRUG TO PREVENT DIABETES-RELATED BLINDNESS

A drug that may prevent the leading cause of blindness is being tested at our medical center. Diabetic retinopathy, a complication of diabetes that blinds 6,000 people each year in the U.S. may be prevented, stabilized, or reversed in its early stages by a drug called aldose reductase inhibitors (ARIs), researchers believe. "This may be a major breakthrough for diabetics because at least until now, there has been no way to prevent diabetic retinopathy," said Dr. Charles M. Clark, professor of medicine and director of our Diabetes Research and Training Center. He is co-investigator on this project with Dr. James A. Fountain, assistant professor of ophthalmology. The study will involve 90-100 diabetic volunteers who must be 18-72 years old who are otherwise healthy and who have had diabetes for 2-30 years without significant eye damage. Female volunteers must be sterile or have completed menopause. Participants will receive free periodic physical and eye exams and laboratory screening. ## 10-YEAR-OLD STUDENTS RIGHTS POLICY TO GET REVIEW

Patricia Boaz, dean of student affairs at IUPUI, has been asked by IU President John W. Ryan to head a task force that will examine and revise the university's current "Statement of Student Rights and Responsibilities." Three people from our campus have been asked to serve on the 15-member committee. They are Steven Akard, former president of the Student Assembly; J. John Harris III, professor of education, and William A. Kerr, professor of law. Some reasons given for the revision include outdated language, lack of uniformity among the campuses, vague procedures, and omissions regarding sexual harassment and other areas.

## NURSING GLEANS AWARDS, APPOINTMENTS

Last month there was a convention here of the Sigma Theta Tau, International Honor Society of Nursing, and deans and faculty in the School of Nursing were given honors and appointments. Angela Barron McBride, Ph.D., professor and associate dean for research, development and resources at the school, was voted president-elect. She will preside from 1987-89 over the 70,000 member group that represents 220 colleges and universities. Sigma Theta Tau's first Presidential Awards for leadership went to Elizabeth Grossman, dean of the school, and to Rebecca T. Markel, associate professor and acting chair, Dept. of Pediatrics. And for fostering high professional standards, former dean and professor emeritus Emily Holmquist was awarded the Dorothy Garrigus Adams Award. Before her retirement in 1973 she had dedicated 42 years to nursing. Also, at a recent annual meeting of the Indiana League for Nursing, Doris R. Blaney, Ed.D., professor and assistant dean, School of Nursing at the Northwest Campus, was chosen Nurse of the Year. She was also recently voted president of the American Lung Association--the fourth female president since it began in 1907.

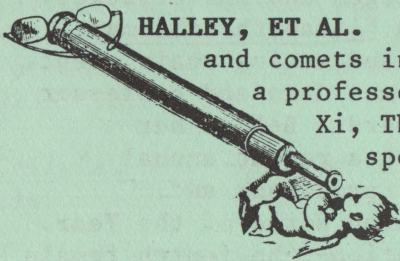
