SCIENCE/ENGINEERING, TECHNOLOGY GET FINAL NOD TO JOIN US

The final go-ahead to begin construction of the long awaited Science/Engineering and Technology building on the "main" campus was given last week by the State Budget Agency, announced Vice President Gerald Bepko and Indiana House of Representatives Speaker Paul Mannweiler. The \$20 million project will bring I.U. and Purdue universities together physically as well as organizationally. The 347,090 gross square feet building will connect to the existing School of Engineering and Technology Building at 799 West Michigan St. This is Phase II of a three-phase plan. Construction will begin next summer or fall, with completion expected by 1990.
