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Nominate colleagues for IU Trustees Teaching Award

Excellence in teaching is recognized each year by the Indiana University Board of Trustees through the Trustees Teaching Award. It's anticipated that more than 50 IU School of Medicine teachers will receive the award this year. Nominations for the 2018

awards are now being accepted with a deadline of Feb. 2, 2018.

Tenured and tenure-track faculty and librarians engaged in teaching are eligible, as are full-time clinical faculty and full-time lecturers whose primary duties are teaching, including IU School of Medicine faculty who may be located at medical centers or be paid by institutions other than Indiana University (e.g., IU Health Physicians, Eskenazi Health, Purdue University, VA, Ball State University, etc.).

Award recipients must have demonstrated a sustained level of teaching excellence in the form of documented student learning and must have completed at least three years of service at IUPUI to be eligible (appointed on or before July 1, 2014).

Two-step login required for students Nov. 2

Starting Nov. 2, all IU School of Medicine students will be required to use Two-Step Login (Duo) authentication to access many IU services. There are steps to take to prepare for this security change so you aren't locked out of important IU technology such as ExamSoft, Canvas, MedHub or email.

What students need to do:

Pick an authentication device (or two)

The School of Medicine recommends using the cell phone Duo mobile app authentication and/or getting a single button hardware token (SBHT) from a **UITS location.**

Students don't need to set up a backup device immediately, but it's recommended to avoid issues if one device is lost or not working. **More information about device options**.

Set up device(s) or attend Duo (setup) Day

In partnership with the Ruth Lilly Medical Library and UITS, Medical Student Education will host a special Duo day from 11 am-1 pm, Friday, Oct. 27, in the Ruth Lilly Medical Library to help students get set up for Duo. SBHT devices will also be passed out at this event.

If a student can't make it, just **stop by UITS** during business hours or **follow these steps to set up a device**.

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Deadline extended: Spinal cord and brain injury research program

The new deadline to apply for the Indiana Traumatic Spinal Cord and Brain Injury Research Activity-Based Program is Friday, Oct. 27. The program is designed to foster and encourage activity-based therapy programs for the prevention, treatment and cure of spinal cord and traumatic brain injuries, including acute management, medical complications, rehabilitative techniques and neuronal recovery. The initiative for funding activity-based therapy programs consists of two mechanisms:

RFA for programs providing rehabilitative clinical care and employing "activitybased" approaches for traumatic spinal cord-injury persons

RFA for programs providing rehabilitative clinical care and employing "activitybased" approaches for traumatic brain-injury persons.

Applications for each RFA may be submitted for up to a maximum requested amount of \$150,000 for the total duration of the project. With questions, email icreate@iu.edu or call 317-278-2822.

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Apply by Dec. 8 for spinal cord and brain injury research grant

Applications are now being accepted for the Indiana Spinal Cord and Brain Injury Research grants to fund studies related to the treatment, cure and prevention of traumatic spinal cord and brain injuries, including acute management, medical complications, rehabilitative techniques and neuronal recovery. Applications are limited to a maximum requested amount of up to \$80,000 per year for two years for basic science proposals and up to \$100,000 per year for two years for proposals with research involving living human subjects.

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Collaboration in Translational Research funding deadline is Dec. 15

Funding is available for the Indiana CTSI Collaboration in Translational Research (CTR) pilot grant program designed to 1) foster and encourage collaborations across CTSI partner institutions; and 2) initiate or continue translational research projects that have very strong and immediate potential to develop into larger, externally funded research programs or generate novel intellectual property.

Applications are evaluated on the quality of the proposed science as well as the application's strength in clarifying the plan for leveraging the award toward the achievement of the two primary CTR objectives. Applications to this program are limited to a total of \$75,000 and are for 24 months. Proposed projects should have at least two principal investigators/collaborators with equal contribution, from at least two of the five sponsoring affiliates for this program. Sponsoring affiliates include IU School of Medicine, IUPUI (non-IU School of Medicine), IU Bloomington, Purdue University (West Lafayette), University of Notre Dame and the Indiana Biosciences Research Institute.

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Jan. 5 is deadline to apply for young investigator awards

The Young Investigator Awards in Clinical-Translational Research are designed to provide promising junior investigator faculty with the opportunity to be mentored in research-intensive, multidisciplinary settings toward the goal of developing careers in clinical-translational research.

Eligible candidates must fall into one of the following categories:

Clinician-scientists with a doctoral degree (physicians, nurses, dentists, pharmacists, clinical psychologists, optometrists, veterinarians, allied health care professionals, etc.) or

Basic scientists with a PhD who are doing translational research that involves some component of human subjects research and has high potential for early translation in impacting patient care.

Benefits include partial salary support, as well as tuition and fees for required and elective coursework, pilot research monies and travel funds to attend the national CTSI young investigator meeting. Additional eligibility requirements are included in the full RFA announcement. Application deadline is Friday, Jan. 5.
