#### HONORS AND ACCOLADES

Roger Wall, assistant professor, Division of Allied Health Sciences, and Director, Cytotechnology Program, recently was elected to the chairmanship of the Cytotechnology Advisory Committee. This position represents the highest elected office for cytotechnologists within the American Society of Cytology, a medical specialty organization.
