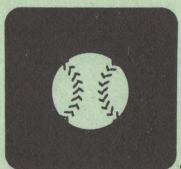

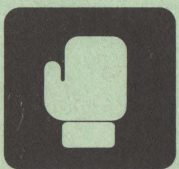

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Pan Am Legacy: Increased Contacts Between IUPUI and Indiana

During the past year, three successful outreach programs were planned by the PANAMELP Office. The programs attempted to strengthen students' understanding of cultures in the hemisphere and to promote interest in the study of other languages.

Indiana Model OAS

The first program, Model OAS, had 293 students from 28 schools. Students simulated the roles of delegates to the Organization of American States.

IUPUI provided the opportunity for the 10 students who were the officers for the Model OAS to visit Washington D.C. in December, 1986, to observe the Model Organization of American States General Assembly, held there each year. As a result of these experiences, the student officers for the Indiana Model OAS produced a videotape demonstrating how the sessions in April would be run. The videotape was made available to all participating schools in the Indiana Model OAS.

Mini Pan American Games

The second program, the Mini Pan Am Games, was held May 9 and enjoyed perfect weather. Students enjoyed the day using Spanish while participating in seven different sports—tennis, softball, soccer, track, swimming, volleyball, and basketball. The IUPUI athletic facilities were used.

Approximately 1,200 students from 50 schools participated.

Summer Intensive Language Session

In the third program, the Summer Intensive Language Session, students from all over Indiana came together to increase their language abilities. During the week-long session, students worked on increasing their skills to give and take messages in Spanish and English, to convert messages from one language to the other, to be able to provide information, and to give and follow directions in Spanish.

The students completed the week highly motivated and prepared for assignments at the Pan American Village during August.

All of the outreach programs for secondary schools have fostered a relationship between the University and secondary schools. The University has donated facilities and given financial support to programs developed, planned, and carried out by secondary teachers.

Approximately 1,700 students have participated in the three programs. Over 90 secondary schools in Indiana have had direct contact with IUPUI. These contacts may be the beginning of further partnerships between secondary schools and the University.

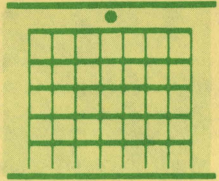
Seven Artists to Record the Games
