Fred Martin retired from teaching on June 30, 1974 after a long and distinguished career. He joined the faculty of the Normal College in 1941 and then entered World War II as a Lt. Gunnery Officer in the U. S. Navy in 1943. He served in the South Pacific, North Atlantic and the Asiatic Theaters. In January of 1946 he returned to his teaching position at the Normal College, where he has served with distinction. His patience and dedication led to the Recognition Award in 1970, given annually by the Student Union Board for outstanding service.

The Indiana Association for Health and Physical Education and Recreation granted him the Honor Award for Achievement and service to the profession for the years he served as Treasurer and Membership Chairman of the Association. During his term of office, the membership doubled due to his strenuous efforts and constant work.

The American Red Cross recognized his professional achievements by presenting him with their Certificate of Appreciation for outstanding service in First Aid, Small Craft, and Water Safety.

Mr. Martin has written several courses of study and contributed to a number of Curricula published by the State Department of Public Instruction.

He served on the American Turners National Technical Committee for many years. He has been a District Counselor and Treasurer of the Indianapolis Alumni Chapter of Phi Epsilon Kappa.

Fred served as Director of Camp Brosius Children's Camp for two years and as the Treasurer of the Normal College Alumni Association for many years. He was the Editor of the Alumni Bulletin, a position he

held for nine years.

Mr. Martin was active as a gymnastic coach and judge. He has given many workshops and exhibitions to promote Physical Education.

He holds memberships in the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation; the Indiana Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation; the Amateur Fencer's League of America; and the National Association for Gymnastic Coaches.

His long years of service to Indiana University and to the teaching profession have earned him a host of friends and admirers. We all join in wishing him happiness in his retirement. The Alumni Association presented him with a large color television set which, he reports, he has put to good use all summer.

The Faculty, the Students and the Alumni all join in saying a very big THANK YOU to Freddie for the wonderful job of teaching and his dedication and hard work that he has given all these years.

A school the size of the Normal College does not lose a teacher the stature of Fred Martin without feeling his absence. Many students ask when Mr. Martin will be coming out for a visit so that they may see him and tell him how much he is missed.

Fred was always ready to take the time and help students with any problems. He never failed to be available whenever needed, and quickly volunteered for faculty responsibilities over and above his own teaching duties.

Mr. Martin possessed rare qualities not always seen in university teachers. He was patient with his students; generous with his efforts of help; kind in his criticism; enthusiastic in his work; and loyal to his profession and school.

The entire faculty, staff and students will miss not seeing his smiling face around our campus everyday. We all look forward to his frequent visits.


In addition to the intramurals, the sports clubs have been popular with karate, wrestling, volleyball, and gymnastics. A new soccer club was formed this year.


Badminton Champ Honored

Sputh Memorial Scholarship. The Stecher Award is given annually to a graduating senior who has excelled in scholarship; skill accomplishments; and who possess personality; character; professional attitudes; leadership; and who has been a service to the profession. Miss Kathryn Amwake was selected to be the 1974 recipient of the William H. Stecher Award. Tracy Mitchell serves as president of the organization while Judy Ramsey is the Vice President. The girls were selected on the basis of academic excellence. All of the faculty and staff of the School of Physical Education are very proud that two of our students were honored and wish to extend our congratulations.

(Formerly Normal College, A.G.U.)

Constitution and By-Laws (as amended April, 1975)

ARTICLE I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Indiana University School of Physical Education Alumni Association (formerly the Alumni Association of the Normal College of the American Gymnastic Union of Indiana University), hereinafter referred to as the Association.

ARTICLE II. Objectives

The general purposes of this Association shall be:

- (a) To further the interests of the Indiana University School of Physical Education.
- (b) To encourage interested and qualified students to matriculate in the School of Physical Education.
- (c) To maintain an interest in the leadership, growth and development of a broad comprehensive program of health education, physical education and recreation education.
- (d) To translate these functions into a program of action appropriate to the needs of the School and the profession.
- (e) To promote good fellowship, good understanding and good will among its members.

ARTICLE III. Membership and Dues

- Sec. 1. Regular. All persons on the membership roll at the present time (April 1975) shall continue in their status of regular membership upon payment of annual dues. After this date, only those persons receiving a degree from the Indiana University School of Physical Education, or who were on the Alumni Roll prior to April 1975, shall be eligible to become members of the Alumni Association upon payment of annual dues.
- Sec. 2. Affiliate.
 - (a) Those who are affiliate members are those persons who do not meet regular membership requirements, but who are academically related to the Indiana University School of Physical Education and who have paid their dues within the fiscal year.
 - (b) Affiliate members shall have all privileges of the Association excepting those of voting and holding office.
- Sec. 3. Honorary. The title of honorary member may be conferred upon persons who have rendered distinguished service in the field of Physical Education or on behalf of the I.U. School of Physical Education or its Alumni Association. This membership does not convey voting privilege. The honorary title shall in no way affect the regular membership of the bearer.
- Sec. 4. <u>Dues</u>. Dues shall be determined by the Executive Council of the Indiana University Alumni Association and the Board of Directors of the School of Physical Education Alumni Association. The dues structure will incorporate the body of alumni who were members before the affiliation with Indiana University. Dues shall be payable annually within the fiscal year.

ARTICLE IV. Officials

- Sec. 1. There shall be a Board of Directors of the Alumni Association whose membership shall consist of the following:
 - (a) the elected officers of the Association shall be a president, presidentelect, secretary, and treasurer, to serve two-year terms assuming office at the close of the annual meeting at which they are elected.
 - (b) the immediate past president of the Association.

- (c) the executive council representative, who will be appointed by the Board of Directors and who will serve a term of three years on the Indiana University Alumni Association Executive Council.
- (d) the two directors-at-large, who will be elected to serve a two year term on the Board of Directors, one to be elected each year after the initial institution of these officers.
- (e) the ex-officio non-voting members, including the Dean of the School of Physical Education (or designated representative) and an Alumni Office representative.
- Sec. 2. A slate of officers consisting of one or more nominees for President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and Director-at-Large shall be presented by the nominating committee at the biennial election meeting of the Association. One or more nominees for Director-at-Large shall constitute the slate for off-year elections. There may be nominations from the floor. A majority vote of those present and voting shall be required for election.

ARTICLE V. Duties

- Sec. 1. The Board of Directors shall have power to function for the Association between annual meetings and shall report to the annual meeting. It shall fill vacancies in office until the next election and shall be the custodian of the Association property.
- Sec. 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association and of the Board of Directors of this Association, and shall perform all duties as are by custom and parliamentary practice required of that office.
- Sec. 3. The President-Elect shall act in the absence of the President. At the end of his two-year term, he shall become President.
- Sec. 4. The Secretary shall keep complete minutes of the meetings of the Association and of the Board of Directors and present same as directed at any meeting. The Secretary shall notify the Indiana University Alumni Office to issue notices of meetings of the Association and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President and the Board of Directors.
- Sec. 5. The Treasurer shall keep proper financial records, account for all receipts and disbursements, and shall make financial reports to the Association at the Annual meeting and at such other times as are designated by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall furnish bond of an amount to be determined by the Board of Directors.
- Sec. 6. The Directors-at-Large shall attend meetings of the Board of Directors and of the Association, and shall perform such duties as designated by the President.
- Sec. 7. The Executive Council Representative shall attend meetings of the Board of Directors and shall represent the Indiana University School of Physical Education Alumni Association at all meetings of the Indiana University Alumni Association Executive Council and shall report to the annual meeting of this Association.

ARTICLE VI. Meetings

- Sec. 1. The annual meeting of the Association shall be held at the time and place of the annual Homecoming.
- Sec. 2. If for any reason Homecoming is cancelled, the President shall call an annual meeting at a time and place agreeable to the Board of Directors. Notice of such meeting must be postmarked 30 days before the meeting date.
- Sec. 3. The Board of Directors shall meet at least once each year, on the call of the President, in addition to the annual meeting of the Association.
- Sec. 4. Twenty-five (25) members of the Association shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII. Committees

- Sec. 1. The standing committees of the Association shall be Nominating, Budget, Auditing, and Recruitment.
- .Sec. 2. Special committees may be appointed by the President when deemed necessary.

ARTICLE VIII. Parliamentary Authority
In all matters not covered by this Constitution and By-Laws, the Association shall be governed by the provisions of Robert's Rules of Order, Revised.

- Sec. 1. The official publication of the Association shall be the <u>School of Physical</u> Education Alumni Bulletin.
- Sec. 2. The subtitle, formerly Normal College, A.G.U., shall be carried on all published matter for a minimum of five (5) years from date of the name-change of the School.

ARTICLE X. Removal from Office

Any elected or appointed officer of the Association may be impeached from office for malfeasance, misfeasance or for non-performance of duties; provided, charges shall be made in writing by at least 3 members of the Board of Directors. The Board shall conduct public hearings not less than forty days nor more than 60 days following the filing of such charges with the President or President-Elect, notice of which hearings shall be given by mail not less than 30 days prior to the hearing. An officer so impeached shall be removed from office by a three-fourths majority of the Board of Directors; provided that a special meeting be held for that purpose and vote be taken within 90 days of filing charges, and the provisions herein as to notice and hearing have been strictly met.

ARTICLE XI. Amendment


Any article or section of the Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at an annual meeting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been submitted to the Board of Directors and has been published in the issue of the School of Physical Education Alumni Bulletin immediately preceding Homecoming.
