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RUSSIANS COMING FOR HEART SYMPOSIUM

A collaborative research effort in the area of <u>sudden death</u>, started in 1976 by a group of American heart specialists and their Russian counterparts under the auspices of the United States National Institutes of Health, will move to the I.U. School of Medicine for a <u>major symposium</u> Dec. 6-8. (The Sudden Death Syndrome is frustrating to heart researchers everywhere. In 25 percent of fatal heart attacks the victim suddenly dies with no warning.)

The group will be hosted by Dr. Douglas P. Zipes and his laboratory at the Krannert Institute of Cardiology. Dr. Zipes, professor of medicine, director of cardiovascular research and senior research associate at the Krannert Institute, is a member of the U.S. group of seven research scientists working with a comparable group of Soviet scientists. Dr. Zipes is known for his work on heart rhythm disturbances, the <u>ultimate cause</u> of sudden death, and on the use of various experimental drugs to control these rhythm disturbances.

Other I.U. medical school participants in the symposium will include Steven C. Beering, Walter J. Daly, Charles Fisch, Suzanne B. Knoebel, D. Eugene Lovelace, Henry R. Besch, Larry R. Jones, August M. Watanabe, Victor Elharrar and John C. Bailey.

The Soviet and American scientists met in Yalta on the Black Sea in October, 1977 to participate in a joint U.S.-USSR sudden death symposium. Dr. Zipes was one of a committee of three American experts who went to the Soviet Union in May of that year to organize the symposium.

Recently, one of Dr. Zipes' associates, Dr. Robert Gilmour, spent three months in Moscow working on a joint research project with Soviet scientists.

Dr. Leonid Rozenshtraukh, a Soviet scientist working at the Myasnikov Institute in Moscow, spent three months working with Dr. Zipes and his associates at the Krannert Institute in 1977, and was the host and collaborator during Gilmour's visit this year. Dr. Rozenshtraukh, who was awarded the <u>USSR State Prize in Medicine</u> in 1978, will return again this fall to continue his collaborative research work at the Krannert Institute. Results of his and Gilmour's previous efforts have been published in both Soviet and American scientific journals.

The entire group of Soviet scientists also has visited the United States and was hosted by I.U. three years ago. The Division of Cardiology at I.U., directed by Dr. Fisch, distinguished professor of medicine and director of the Krannert Institute, is known world-wide for its <u>prominence in cardiovascular</u> <u>research</u>. This heart research and training program, made possible by support of the Krannert charitable trust and I.U., will be the site of the first U.S.-USSR symposium on sudden death held in the United States. Results of December's symposium will be published in medical journals in both countries. The next symposium of the entire group will be held in Moscow in 1981, along with the International Meeting of the World Congress of Cardiology.
