With the unanimous approval of our department Program Directors Committee (20 February 2009) and of the department as a whole (10 April 2009), I am submitting for your approval the following revision of the undergraduate major in English. This revision was initiated in response to the department's new Strategic Plan, which has as one of its objectives the strengthening of our undergraduate offerings.

Scope and Rationale

The overall framework for the English major will remain the same. As we currently offer, the major will continue to consist of six, 33-credit concentration options with each concentration (except one, explained below) having a four-part structure: Gateway, Core Courses, English Experience (previously called distribution courses), and Capstone. The concentration options will continue to be Creative Writing, Film Studies, Language and Linguistics, Literature, Writing and Literacy, and the renamed *English Studies* concentration (previously called "individualized concentration").

The following revisions are being recommended in order to provide a more coherent curriculum for each concentration. All changes were proposed by faculty in the respective concentrations and, as noted above, have been unanimously approved at the committee and department levels after thorough discussion. Broadly, the most significant changes with these revisions are as follows:

Gateway: Several of the concentrations—Creative Writing, Film Studies, Linguistics, and the renamed concentration in English Studies—have increased the gateway component from 3 to 6 credit hours in order to better prepare students for upper level offerings within the concentrations.

Concentration Core: The core area of each of the concentrations has been revised in order to (1) improve learning outcomes, (2) make the path through the concentrations more clear and user friendly, (3) better prepare students for post-graduation employment opportunities and/or graduate work in their fields, and (4) make sure that as many credit hours as possible taken within the department count toward graduation. In the case of the renamed concentration in English Studies, the changes are aimed at ensuring that students have a comprehensive introduction to—and wide-ranging experience of—the field of English studies as a whole.

English Experience: The former distribution component of the major (renamed English Experience) has been revised to make better use of faculty resources and expertise outside each of the concentrations, and to offer more direction to students in the concentrations. Whereas the old model simply mandated that students take 9 credit hours at the 200 level or above in three different areas of the department outside their concentrations, the revisions point students in the direction of specific courses outside their concentrations that have been chosen in order to better prepare students for post-graduation employment opportunities and/or graduate work in their fields. (Because the English Studies concentration core already requires a broad distribution of courses from across the department, it does not include a separate English Experience requirement.)

Capstone: Under the previous requirements, all English majors were required to take a single capstone course (E450); with this revision, students will be offered the option of taking E450 or additional approved capstone experiences that provide concentration-specific courses that will prepare students for employment or graduate studies.

NOTE: The current concentration requirements are provided in Appendix 1, "Current English Concentrations." The specific revisions for each of the six English concentrations are outlined in Appendix 2, "Revised English Concentrations."

Conclusion

These changes to the English major are the result of two semesters of planning and department-wide discussion that followed the approval of our Strategic Plan in October 2008. None of the changes are controversial, and all have been designed to better serve our students and to make the best use possible of our existing faculty resources. It is our hope to have these changes approved by the Curriculum Committee this semester (Spring 2009) so that they may be presented to the SLA Faculty Assembly at its first meeting in September 2009 and (if approved) adopted at the beginning of the Spring 2010 semester. Needless to say, even after they have gone into effect, all students who began work on their majors under the old requirements will be given the choice of finishing under those requirements or switching to these.
