

GENEROSITY THE CORNERSTONE OF NEW LIBRARY

As ground was broken Aug. 1 for the new IUPUI library, President Thomas Ehrlich and Chancellor Gerald Bepko warmly acknowledged the many gifts that are making possible the five-story limestone, glass and concrete building. Through an I.U. Foundation telefund, alumni have pledged \$224,000. Other Friends of the Library, Lilly Endowment, Inc., the Eli Lilly and Co. Foundation and Indiana lawmakers are helping with the \$32 million University Library. A gift from Mr. and Mrs. Richard W. Wood will support a plaza; the Edna B. Lacy family gave a large donation for the Lacy Periodicals Room that will span half the main level, and a gift of the Efroymsen family through the Moriah Fund, Inc., will be used a special way.

A HEALTHY WALK CAN PREVENT NEW LIBRARY PARKING WOES



As the pavement comes up to make way for the new library, parking spaces must be sacrificed in the lots at the site near E/T and B/S. So, John Nolte, director of parking services, wants you to know that "next year will be very difficult for parking access." He recommends we park at the perimeters and walk to our destination--a sure sign that IUPUI has come into its own as a "real" college campus. In the meantime, new lots are being developed and the current ones used more effectively. Displaced A spaces are now in lot 71, across Michigan Street from the E/T Building and in lot 75 which is adjacent to the Bowers Building, across University Boulevard from Cavanaugh Hall. Dislocated B spaces are relocated to lot 69, across North Street at the East Garage, and more E spaces will be available when buildings are razed at the east end of campus. Garage passes will be a good idea this coming year, and Nolte notes that a new garage is planned at Blake and New York Streets, and the East Garage will be expanded

"PITCHBLEND AND PLUTONIUM" AND MOORE ARE FALL OPENERS AT HERRON

The haunting territory of world contamination is visited by former Herron School of Art students Ann and George Page whose collaborative exhibition "Pitchblende and Plutonium" runs Sept. 1-Oct. 13 at the Herron Gallery/Indianapolis Center for Contemporary Art. Ann's 47-foot ark sculpture and eight smaller sculptures by George are in the multimedia show. The Pages will give a free public lecture Aug. 29 at 1 p.m., and on Aug. 31 there is a public reception for them from 7-9 p.m., both in the gallery.

A second exhibition featuring paintings by African-American artist John L. ENTRY TO EDIN EASY

EDIN, the Economic Development Information Network, an online network of information and statistical databases, is being made accessible to all faculty, staff and students with accounts on the IndyVax computer. A unique resource that has been maintained by the Indiana Business Research Center (IBRC) in the School of Business for many years. It provides access to economic and demographic data for the U.S., each of the 50 states, Indiana counties, cities and metropolitan statistical areas. These data can be used for research on population, employment, industry, income, transportation and social welfare, among others. A joint venture between IBRC and IUPUI Computing Services, the system is designed for easy transfer of information from mainframe to personal computer. All IU library systems have access and some faculty members use EDIN in their classrooms. EDIN is now available within the university as option #11 on the Scholar's network. An access code is required for IndyVax. Call Therese Miller, 4-0705 in Computing Services with an ERIN manual is available for \$6.

FINALLY...
