Don Brown, MD, to give 2017 commencement address

Donald E. Brown, MD, an Indianapolis tech entrepreneur and IU School of Medicine alumnus, will give the school's 2017 commencement address on Saturday, May 13, in the Sagamore Ballroom at the Indiana Convention Center in downtown Indianapolis.

Last December, Dr. Brown gifted \$30 million to IU School of Medicine to establish the Brown Center for Immunotherapy, which aims to develop new treatments and cure disease through the use of cell-based immunotherapies. Dr. Brown's gift is the largest ever from an IU School of Medicine alumnus.

Dr. Brown received a bachelor of science in physics from Indiana University Bloomington in 1978 and later enrolled in a combined MD/PhD program with the intent of becoming a laboratory researcher. He later switched his focus to computer science, earning a master of science in computer science in 1982 before finishing medical school in 1985.

Dr. Brown launched his first software company, Dealership Programming Inc., while still in medical school. The company made it easier for car dealerships to calculate monthly loan payments for customers financing cars. In 1988, he co-founded Software Artistry Inc., a developer of customer support software that was later acquired by IBM. In 1994, Dr. Brown started Interactive Intelligence, which became a leader in call center and communication technologies. Interactive Intelligence was acquired in December 2016 by Genesys Telecommunications Laboratories Inc.

Film about Dr. Brantly's battle with Ebola releases today

Medical missionary Kent Brantly, MD, an IU School of Medicine alumnus and the first person to be treated on U.S. soil for Ebola, is sharing his survival story through a film entitled "Facing Darkness." The movie is being screened in select cinemas across the U.S. today and again on Monday, April 10.

Dr. Brantly, who graduated from IU School of Medicine in 2009, was serving as a medical missionary with Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization, in Monrovia, Liberia, from October 2013 to August 2014, when he contracted the deadly Ebola virus. Subsequently, he was evacuated to Emory University Hospital and successfully treated with the experimental drug Zmapp.

In May 2015, Dr. Brantly gave the IU School of Medicine commencement address. "Facing Darkness" was produced by Samaritan's Purse. The film is being screened in cities across Indiana. For more details and to purchase tickets, visit the movie's website.

Today is National Doctors' Day

The March 30 date was chosen because it marks the anniversary of the first use of general anesthesia in 1842 by Dr. Crawford W. Long, who used ether while removing a cyst from patient James Venable's neck.

IU to participate in study to improve care for TBI patients

IU School of Medicine will participate with six other Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) centers nationwide in a study led by a research team at University of Washington School of Medicine. The lead research team, based at the University of Washington, received \$12.7 million to improve post-acute care for patients with TBI. The funding, announced this month, comes from the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute, an independent nonprofit organization established by the U.S. Congress in 2010 to improve patient outcomes.

The University of Washington team plans to enroll 900 people with moderate to severe traumatic brain injury who are discharged from inpatient rehabilitation at one of six TBI Model System Centers: University of Washington, Indiana University, Ohio State University, Mt. Sinai in New York, Moss Rehabilitation in Philadelphia and Baylor Institute for Rehabilitation in Dallas.

The patients will be randomized to one of two groups: standardized discharge care, which includes advice and referral sources, and standardized discharge care with a care manager who will assess for unmet needs and assist with coordination of care via telephone over six months. The project team will compare functioning and quality of life at three, six, nine and 12 months in these two groups.

Research study compares hospice care in multiple venues

A new study from the Indiana University Center for Aging Research and the Regenstrief Institute has found only minimal differences in the intensity of hospice services provided in nursing homes as compared to hospice services provided to patients in assisted living facilities or their homes. However, the mix of services did vary by site type.

Researchers, led by Center for Aging Research and Regenstrief Institute investigator Kathleen Unroe, MD, MHA, IU School of Medicine assistant professor of medicine, analyzed data from more than 32,600 men and women in 18 states who received routine hospice care from 2009 to 2015. Approximately 43 percent had short--less than two weeks--hospice episodes while 20 percent were in hospice care for greater than six months.

"It has been a concern that patients who live in nursing homes or assisted living facilities may be getting potentially less hospice care than people receiving hospice care at home," Dr. Unroe said. "We found that not to be the case. However, while the intensity of hospice services across settings was quite similar, people living at home were more likely to get more hospice nurse care, while those living in nursing homes or in assisted living facilities received more hospice aide care across the hospice episode."

The Faculty Vitality Survey© was recently sent to all full- and part-time faculty, including affiliates. The survey measures the synergy between satisfaction, productivity and engagement to increase understanding of the faculty experience, with a goal of making improvements.

The survey has been conducted at IU School of Medicine every other year since 2006. Results of the Vitality Survey provide rich data for making changes and improvements. Examples of changes at IU School of Medicine, based on the survey's findings, include lengthening the tenure probationary period from seven to nine years and the approval of a paid maternity leave policy in the multi-specialty practice plan.

Foundations of Clinical Practice instruction positions open

IU School of Medicine Medical Student Education is now accepting applications for small group instructional positions for the Foundations of Clinical Practice (FCP) Year One and Year Two courses, which are part of the school's new curriculum.

Foundations of Clinical Practice (FCP) Years One and Two are an integrated series of lectures, small-group discussions and simulated patient encounters along with a clinical component. The courses provide instruction in fundamental clinical skills such as taking a patient history, documenting a patient encounter, and performing a physical examination of a normal adult and creating a differential diagnosis. Students are also introduced to social determinants of health, barriers to care, fundamentals of communication, interprofessional education, and systems-based practices. Professionalism, ethics and the student's emerging role as a health care provider are addressed throughout the course.


