HISTORY COUNCIL COMES TO CAMPUS

Headquarters for the 1,800-member National Council on Public History is now at IUPUI and is directed by Elizabeth B. Monroe. The Council was at Northeastern University in Boston. Monroe, assistant director of the POLIS Research Center at IUPUI, also is the new executive secretary for the national council. It was organized to promote interest in public history and publishes a quarterly newsletter, "Public History News." It also sponsors special projects, conferences and other publications about the subject. Monroe, who teaches constitutional history at IUPUI, notes that Council membership includes historians who work and research in academia, as well as other venues, such as private industry, libraries and the media. Companies such as Coca-Cola Co., Sears and Wells Fargo hire historians, and she noted that last year the state of Florida had 448 employers who hired historians. "While many historians still teach in classrooms, many work in other areas, which reflects the growing popular appreciation of history brought about by the bicentennials of the Revolution and the Constitution, 'Roots,' and other creative historical presentations," Monroe said. ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP "CENTERS" AT SPEA

Bloomington announces that the Midwestern regional center of the new National Institute for Global Environmental Change (NIGEC) will be located at IUB, and through SPEA, will operate an interdisciplinary, multi-investigator research center. Senior personnel will initially be drawn from SPEA and the departments of biology, geography and geology and they will explore global environmental changes, particularly those associated with increasing global temperatures caused by humans. The program was expected to get under way following approval last month of an agreement between the U.S. Dept. of Energy, which is providing \$6 million for start-up, and the University of California, where the NIGEC will be directed. Directing the regional center at IUB will be J.C. Randolph, professor of public and environmental affairs and former associate dean for research and external programs at SPEA. 
