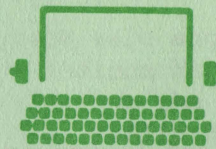

HOUSTON SCHOLARSHIP ESTABLISHED

A new scholarship, the first of its kind, has been established in memory of the late Professor Sidney W. Houston, who served on the English staffs at both the Purdue and Indiana University Indianapolis campuses, from 1963 to 1975. Professor Houston gave courses in Technical Communications, Literature, and Linguistics. The scholarship will be awarded to an outstanding student annually, in alternate years, in Technical Communication, and in the departments of English, French, German, and Spanish.

HONORS AND ACCOLADES

Wins Award -- Reginald C. Eggleton, associate director of the Fortune-Fry Laboratory (ultrasound research division of the Indianapolis Center for Advanced Research) and professor of surgical research at the I.U. School of Medicine, will receive the Harold Laufman Award of the Foundation of the Association for the Advancement of Medical Instrumentation next month. He will be honored for his "substantial contribution to the development of the ultrasonic sector scanner." The award, which will be made during the AAMI's Annual Meeting May 10 in Washington, D.C., consists of a plaque and citation plus a cash honorarium.

Honored -- David Kresz Rubins, faculty member at the Herron School of Art since 1935, was honored at a special dedication for his sculpture "Stumbling Man" on the grounds of the Indianapolis Museum of Art. The bronze work, now in the museum's permanent collection, was made originally in the 1960's as part of a State House competition in memory of Indiana coal miners.
