# PUBLIC FORUM TO FOCUS ON 'SERVICEABLE EXPERTISE'

A free public forum on March 29, sponsored by our new Metropolitan Affairs Committee, will focus on community health care, urban land use, the relation of urban universities (that's us) to their city neighbors and computer education. It will be held in Lecture Hall and opens at 1 p.m. with a keynote address by well-known educator and civil-rights activist Frank Hale, vice provost for minority affairs at Ohio State U. He will speak on "Relations of Urban Universities to their Constituent Communities." Beginning at 1:45 p.m. Lawrence S. Connor, managing editor of The Indianapolis Star, will respond to Hale's address. Other respondents include Howard G. Schaller, executive dean and dean of faculties, and Kenneth Morgan, director of the Madame Walker Urban Life Center. #### 2,000 EXPECTED HERE FOR ASPA CONFERENCE

A couple thousand delegates from around the U.S. are expected here for the National Conference of the American Society for Public Administration at the Convention Center, March 23-27. Hosts are I.U., our campus and the School of Public and Environment Affairs (SPEA). Among the speakers and panelists are Rudolph Penner, director of the Congressional Budget Office, who will be on a panel to discuss the huge federal deficits forecast for the rest of the decade; James W. Lucas, director of the crisis management planning staff of the National Security Council; Arthur Flemming, former chairman of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, who will head a panel to discuss affirmative action, and another former Civil Rights Commission member Jill Ruckelshaus, who will lead a debate-format panel about equal pay for equal work. Indiana senior Senator Richard G. Lugar will open the convention March 24 at noon. Mayor William H. Hudnut III and Gary Mayor Richard G. Hatcher will also be on panels discussing the affects of federal budget cutbacks on local governments. Gov. Robert D. Orr will speak on the role of governments in economic revitalization efforts. ### HARVARD PHYSICIAN/AUTHOR TO SPEAK ON NUCLEAR CONSEQUENCES

Dr. Helen M. Caldicott, Australian-born instructor of pediatric medicine at the Harvard U. Medical School, will give a free public lecture on March 28, 5:30 p.m., Lecture Hall, Room 101. The founder of Physicians for Social Responsibility, she will discuss "The Medical Consequences of Nuclear Warfare." ## HAIR LOSS, SKIN CANCER, WRINKLES AND SCARS ON DERMATOLOGY AGENDA

The School of Medicine, Department of Dermatology, will present a continuing medical education program March 27 for family and general practitioners, internists, pediatricians and other physicians. About 150 people are expected to attend the Dermatology Update for the Non-Dermatologist, which includes presentations by IU faculty members on cosmetic surgery for scars and wrinkles, hair loss and replacement, Kaposi's Sarcoma (a complication sometimes seen with AIDS), skin cancer and also a number of public health concerns which doctors must deal with.
