DEAN FRANCOIS ACCEPTS NEW POST

Dr. Martha E. Francois, dean of the I.U. School of Liberal Arts at IUPUI since 1978, has resigned to accept the position of vice president for academic affairs at Ramapo College of New Jersey at Mahwah. She came here from Northeastern College at Boston where she was a professor of history and active in professional and professorial organizations.

Dr. James R. East, associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts, has been named acting dean until a replacement is selected.

"Dean Francois has been instrumental in strengthening the programs in liberal arts — and starting new ones — that have attracted more students and interest in the academic disciplines that form the core of a comprehensive university like IUPUI. We fully predict that she will continue her successes at Ramapo," said Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., I.U. vice president (Indianapolis).

Dean East has been with the university since the days before the merger of I.U. and Purdue programs in 1969. (He was appointed associate dean of the then Downtown Campus in 1967.) He also holds the academic appointment of professor of speech and theater. He received his undergraduate degree from Indiana Central University and graduate degrees from Stanford University. For his pioneering work with the Learn & Shop and Weekend College programs at IUPUI and for his many services to the community, Dean East has been the recipient of a Casper Award and a Jefferson Award.
