Welcome Dr. Muna Jneidi

In September IU Geriatrics welcomed geriatrician Muna Jneidi, MD, to our program. Dr. Jneidi is an assistant professor of clinical medicine with clinical activities that include providing consultative services to patients and families in the Senior Health Center at Methodist Hospital, and in providing primary care to residents of local nursing facilities. She completed an Internal Medicine Residency at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center-Shadyside Hospital and a Geriatric Medicine Fellowship at the Mayo Clinic College of Medicine in Rochester, Minnesota.

ACE at IU Hospital Marks First Anniversary

Cathy Schubert, MD, reports that the Acute Care for Elders (ACE) consultation service she provides at Indiana University Hospital is "alive and well" as it passed the one year mark. She reports that she currently works closely with hematology, oncology, and internal medicine services and adds that the ACE consults "have been well received thus far." On the educational front, Dr. Schubert began hosting residents on ACE at IU Hospital in July of 2006.



A pilot program funded through the Indianapolis Retirement Home Fund has bridged the gap in quality health care for low-income patients aged 65 and older. The patients had been seen in Wishard Hospital's Emergency Department (ED) and/or were discharged from the hospital but did not have a primary care physician.

The Bridge program utilized the GRACE model of care including an advance practice nurse (APN) and social worker (SW) of the Senior Care program at Wishard who performed a complete geriatric assessment of the patient in their home and developed a plan of care with an interdisciplinary geriatrics team (geriatrician, pharmacist, mental health social worker, and community-based services liaison) to fully address the needs of the patient and family. A primary care physician was identified for the patient and an appointment arranged. The Bridge APN and SW collaborated with the patient's new physician to jointly follow the patient, implement the plan of care, connect the patient with community services, and coordinate the patient's care for up to six months.

In tracking the before and after use of the Wishard ED, the 100 Marion County pilot program participants showed a more than 50% reduction in ED visits after being connected with a primary care physician. Wishard continues to support the Bridge program to continue to provide vulnerable elders ready access to primary care services and to reduce ED utilization.

GRANTS

Principal Investigator Matthew Bair, MD, MS, has received funding from the IU Roybal Center for a pilot study, "Self-Management for Patients with Chronic Musculoskeletal Pain - Finding What Works." In the context of a clinical trial of primary care patients with musculoskeletal pain and depression, Dr. Bair and his research team are conducting a series of focus groups to identify which self-management strategies patients perceive to be most helpful for their chronic pain, as well as the barriers and facilitators to adopting these strategies. He is also examining patient and clinical characteristics that predict adoption of pain self-management strategies by analyzing data from PI Dr. Kurt Kroneke's R01, "Stepped-Care for Affective Disorders and Musculoskeletal Pain."

The IU Center for Aging Research is home to the National Institute on Aging Edward R. Roybal Center for Research on Applied Gerontology, known locally as the IU Roybal Center.
