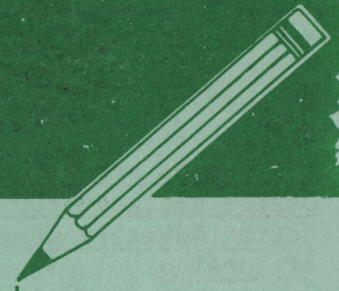

PRESIDENTIAL REPORT

Dr. John W. Ryan, Indiana University president, will address members of the I.U. community Tuesday (March 11) from 3:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Dr. Ryan's report, emphasizing the university's research activities, will be carried over the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunications System. At IUPUI the speech can be viewed in Room 143 of Cavanaugh Hall, in Room 326 of the Medical Science Building, and in Room 259 of the Krannert Building at the 38th Street Campus.

WEBER NAMED TO TOP POST AT HERRON

Nationally known sculptor and artist Arthur H. Weber Jr. has been named dean of the Herron School of Art of IUPUI by the I.U. board of trustees.

Weber, chairman of the department of design and professor of visual communications, has been serving as the school's interim executive officer since the 1973 resignation of Benjamin de Brie Taylor, now director of the Illinois Institute of Technology at Chicago.

"Arthur Weber's demonstrated artistic and administrative abilities more than qualify him for this important post," said Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., I.U. vice-president (Indianapolis). "We are confident that Herron's fine national and international reputation will continue to grow under his leadership."

The 46-year-old Weber, who has been on the Herron faculty since 1956, has exhibited his works extensively in shows such as the Indiana Artists Exhibition, Cincinnati and Vicinity Artists, Northwest Printmakers in Seattle, print exhibitions in Dallas and Dayton, traveling shows and private galleries.

The new dean has won many awards for his sculpture, most notably a silver medal from the Cincinnati Chapter of the American Institute of Architects for co-ordinated use of sculpture and architecture. Other sculpture awards have come from the Indiana State Fair, Glendale-Herron Art Exhibition and the Indianapolis "500" Festival of the Arts.

A native of Cincinnati, Weber was awarded a diploma from the Cincinnati Art Academy in 1956. He and his wife, Nancy Lou Weber, are the parents of four children. They live at 2729 East Maynard Drive, Indianapolis.

SECOND TIME AROUND

The second series of free workshop sessions sponsored by IUPUI Affirmative Action Office designed for IUPUI management personnel and unit representatives on Affirmative Action Advisory Council will be held Thursday from 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the School of Nursing.

Workshop A on non-instructional personnel will cover clerical dilemmas, locked-in positions, movement to middle management, to top management, initial appointments, training grants, and manpower programs. Chair for this workshop in Room 232 will be Marjorie P. Leamson, director of Continuing Education Services, IUPUI. Panelists include Mary Wyatt, planning officer, Indiana Office of Manpower Development; Maureen Prevost, co-ordinator of the IUPUI Women's Center; Mary Jane Maxwell, personnel, and Sheldon Bergman, assistant director of hospitals.

Workshop B on instructional personnel will cover academic offerings, degree and non-degree and special use of part-time instructional staff, use of instructional media, IHETS, and educational TV. Chair for the workshop in Room 233 will be Robert DeBard, co-ordinator, Continuing Education Services, IUPUI. Panelists include T. Beatrice Holland, director, Indiana State Civil Rights Commission; Elmer Friman, MERP director, and Norman L. Mikesell, director of Instructional Media Systems, IUPUI.

Both workshops are open to everyone, instructional or non-instructional personnel, and are run concurrently, then repeated, so that persons wishing to do so can attend both.

PHARMACY CHANGES

Because of the relocation of various segments of the Pharmacy Department and in order to provide better inpatient care, the following changes in pharmacy locations and hours have gone into effect:

The hours for the Outpatient Pharmacy on the first floor of University Hospital, Room N-106, and the Outpatient Pharmacy on the first floor of Riley Hospital, Room A-173, are now 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. This means that there is no outpatient prescription service available on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

All outpatient prescriptions should be presented to the outpatient areas.

All inpatient prescriptions should be presented at University Hospital, Room R-076. Riley inpatient prescriptions should be presented in Room A-173 of Riley. All I.V. additive and hyperalimentation fluid prescription should be presented to University Hospital basement, Room R-076.

Inpatient "take-home" prescriptions should be presented to the outpatient areas from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday only. At all other times these prescriptions, to be taken home, should be presented to Room R-076 basement of University Hospital for processing.

The Sample Room, Room N-108, will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.
