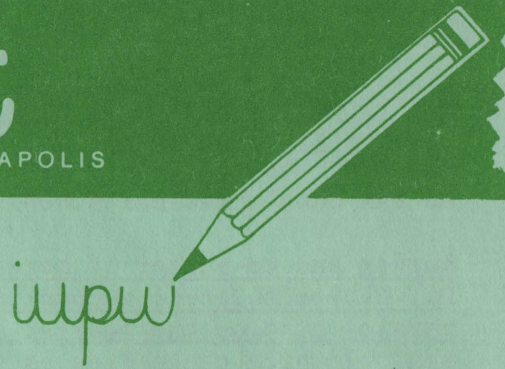

GENERAL-LY SPEAKING

Co-ordination and co-operation in the medical direction of the Indiana University Hospitals and Marion County General Hospital, begun with a rather loose arrangement in 1969, has been given a tremendous boost with the signing of the two-year trial agreement for the I.U. School of Medicine to take over all medical management at General, according to Dr. Steven C. Beering, medical school dean.

The first move toward integrating the systems was the appointment of Dr. John L. Glover, chairman of surgery at General since 1971 and professor of surgery, as acting director for General.

"We have a marvelous opportunity here to create one of the leading medical centers in the country, a truly tremendous facility both for Marion County and for the entire state," Dr. Beering said, "and in John Glover we have a man with the administrative ability and the confidence of the entire medical staff."

Under the prior arrangement, while all physicians at General were School of Medicine faculty members or residents and interns, and many medical school departments had branches at General, this was as far as the medical school jurisdiction went. Now, Dr. Beering points out, all professional services, including nursing, clinics, hospital administration, even the General Hospital School of Nursing, will come under immediate supervision of the School of Medicine.

While it may take even longer than the two-year trial period to integrate fully the systems and streamline the organization, Robert Kidd, General Hospital administrator says, many programs have been anticipated both by the Health and Hospital Corporation and I.U. that will avoid duplication of services. (The Health and Hospital Corporation will retain control of the budget, the business office and patient accounts, as well as general housekeeping and building maintenance.)

Joint ventures planned some time ago that will be facilitated by the change include housing of most of the Medical Center clinics in the new Regenstrief Health Center, use by the entire Medical Center complex of the new emergency facility to be built next to General, and the establishment of a new adult burn unit at General.

With the completion of the Regenstrief Health Center, the new parking garage west of it, and the bridge building between it and General for the emergency facility, General Hospital and the Krannert Institute of Cardiology will be added to the Medical Center's tunnel system, so that all buildings will be connected underground for transfer of patients and other personnel.

It is expected that under the new management more physicians will bring their private patients to General. (University Hospital has been running close to capacity for some time.) If the patient revenue is increased measurably, I.U. will receive 75 per cent of the increase as a management fee which will be used for further improvement of General.

Dr. Glover, a native of Nashville, Tenn., received his undergraduate and medical degrees from Vanderbilt University. He took his internship and residency at the I.U. Medical Center from 1958 to 1966, with two years out for military service. He has been a medical school faculty member since 1967.

Author and co-author of more than 30 publications in scientific journals, one of Dr. Glover's latest accomplishments--along with Dr. William J. Link, a Ph.D. in physics also on the medical school faculty--has been the development of a gas scalpel which cauterizes as it cuts to control severe bleeding in operating on blood-rich organs like the kidney or liver. Dr. Glover is a former member of the school's kidney transplant team.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the Society of Sigma Xi and secretary-treasurer of the Indiana Chapter of the American College of Surgeons. He also is a member of the medical advisory board of the Kidney Foundation of Indiana and a founding member of the American Trauma Society.

DR. MITCHELL DIES

Services for Dr. David Farrar Mitchell, chairman of the department of oral diagnosis at the School of Dentistry, were held Monday with burial following in Crown Hill Cemetery. Dr. Mitchell, who had been on the dental faculty for 20 years, died July 17.

A native of Arkansas City, Kan., he received his undergraduate and DDS degrees from the University of Illinois and its College of Dentistry. He was awarded his doctorate from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry in 1948.

A former major in the Army Reserve Dental Corps, he was chief of the department of dentistry at the Army Air Force School of Aviation Medicine. Randolph Field, Tex. He received the National Institutes of Health Senior Research Fellow award in 1948 and was an instructor of dentistry at the University of Rochester. He also served as associate professor of dentistry at the University of Minnesota before coming to Indiana.

Dr. Mitchell was a member of the American Dental Association, Indiana State Dental Association, Indianapolis District Dental Society and Sigma Xi fraternity. He was president of the American Association for Dental Research and editor of "Journal of Dental Research." He contributed to more than 100 publications and was senior author of "Oral Diagnosis/Oral Medicine." He was a member of the American Academy of Oral Pathology, American Board of Oral Pathology and Delta Sigma Delta.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Trone Mitchell; daughter, Mrs. Lindsay Miller, and two sons, Dana S. and David F. Mitchell of Indianapolis. Memorial contributions may be sent to the American Lung Association of Central Indiana.
