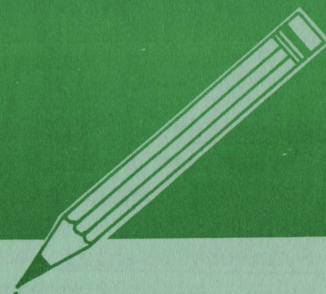

NEW ADVISORY BOARD LEADERS

A new chairman and vice-chairman have been elected to head the Advisory Board to the Chancellor of IUPUI. Dr. C. W. Pettinga, executive vice-president of Eli Lilly and Company, has been elected chairman of the advisory board. Carroll H. Blanchar, chairman and chief executive officer, Public Service Indiana, was elected vice-chairman.

At their monthly meetings, members of the advisory board review policies and proposals for development of IUPUI. The board includes 11 representative civic leaders from each of the universities.

Dr. Pettinga succeeds Frank E. McKinney, chairman of the executive committee of American Fletcher Corporation, as chairman of the board. As vice-chairman, Blanchar succeeds Jack Dustman, manufacturers' agent and chairman of the Education Committee of the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce.

Members of the advisory board provide counsel to IUPUI Chancellor Maynard K. Hine. At their September meeting, board members analyzed a report on long-range campus planning, approved a proposal to establish more extensive computer services at various campus locations, and considered plans to inventory and promote educational resources in the Indianapolis area.

MATH SEMINAR SET

Mathematicians from Bloomington, Lafayette and the Indianapolis area will meet in a seminar which will begin this week at IUPUI. Talks on advanced research in topology will be given by faculty from Purdue, I.U. and IUPUI.

The first meeting of the seminar will be Thursday from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. in Room 207 of Fesler Hall. The speakers will be Professor Jan Jawarowski, I.U., who will discuss "Extension and Retraction Properties of Spaces with Compact Lie Group Action," and Professor Daniel Gottlieb, Purdue, who will talk about "Manifolds with Nonzero Euler-Poincare Number."

Professor Michael Gemignani, chairman of the Department of Mathematical Sciences at IUPUI, said: "The seminar represents an important opportunity for co-operation and sharing ideas in a basic area of modern mathematical research." The seminar is expected to meet monthly.
