Sports injuries, allergies, growth hormones and risk-taking behavior among children are among the topics to be discussed during the 20th annual Multidisciplinary Child Care Conference, May 1-2, at the Airport Hilton. #### THREE FROM IUPUI HONORED DURING FOUNDERS DAY

Three faculty members from this campus were among those who received awards during the recent annual IU Founders Day ceremonies at Bloomington. Ting K. Li, the John B. Hickam Professor of Medicine and professor of biochemistry, was one of six named Distinguuished Professor. He is internationally recognized for research on the biochemistry of genetic differences in metabolism of alcohol. He is president-elect of the Research Society on Alcholism, from which he recieved its highest award. Also, two faculty members from this campus were among the 14 instructors given cash awards for superior teaching skills. They are Jesse D. Hubbard, professor of pathology, IU School of Medicine, who received the President's Award, and Susan B. Sutton, assistant professor of anthropology, School of Liberal Arts, who received an Amoco Foundaton Award. They were chosen by peers and students.
