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## IUPUI METROS: EIGHTH SEASON OPENS NEXT MONTH

The IUPUI Metros will open their eighth basketball season November 7 at 5 p.m. against the Titans of Marion (Ind.) College. The game will be played at Market Square Arena (MSA) before the start of the Indiana Pacers-Portland game.

This is the second year the Metros will play part of their home schedule at MSA. Eight contests will be on the court there, with the remaining seven scheduled at the Harry E. Wood Continuing Education Center. All MSA games will begin at 5 p.m., except for the game with Oakland City College, which starts at 7 p.m. Games at Wood have 7:30 p.m. starting times.

The 1979-80 schedule contains more home games than any previous season: 15 of the 31 games on the schedule will be played at Indianapolis. Three of the road trips will be to tournaments -- at Taylor University, Ferris State and the University of Missouri at Kansas City (UM-KC).

Dr. Robert D. Bunnell, IUPUI athletic coordinator, pointed out that the price for the Metros/Pacers games is a bargain for students, faculty and staff. Single tickets for MSA games will cost \$3.30, for a seat that would sell for \$6.50 if purchased through the usual Pacer ticket sale outlets. Season tickets for all 15 Metros home games plus eight Pacer games are \$30. A single seat at the Wood Center will cost \$2.

Tickets are on sale now at the Cavanaugh Hall Student Activities Office (Room 322), the Department of Psychology Office (see Cathi Egan) in Room 54 of the Krannert Science Building, Room 345 of the School of Nursing, and at the School of Physical Education, 1010 West 64th Street. Those wishing to purchase blocks of tickets may contact Bunnell at Ext. 2725.

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#### PRIMARY HEALTH CARE IS PRIMARY CONCERN

The second annual Primary Health Care Conference will be held at the I.U. School of Nursing on Friday from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Again, the conference focuses on the World Health Organization's concept of primary health as it applies to the United States. The main speakers will be Dr. Henrik L. Blum at 9 a.m. and Dr. Victor W. Sidel at 11 a.m.

Dr. Blum is a professor of health planning at the University of California at Berkeley. He is the author of a recently published book, Planning for Health. He will speak on "Planning for Health in the Community."

Dr. Sidel is professor and chairman, Department of Social Medicine, Montefiore Hospital and Medical Center at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine. His appearance here will follow his return from the People's Republic of China--a visit upon which his talk will be focused, "Health Care in China 1971-79: Implications for the United States." Dr. Sidel has extensive experience in international health programs, including USSR, Great Britain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, People's Republic of China, Chile and Cuba.

After each speaker's hour-long talk, there will be an hour for questions and answers. At 1:30 p.m., an open forum will be held with both speakers.
