



Dean Gilmore Earns a Diploma and a Term as Alumni President

Last September, H. William Gilmore (DDS'58) became Indiana University's first dental alumnus to assume the presidency of the IU Alumni Association, an organization with more than 76,000 members worldwide.

He also became the first person to acquire the title while serving as dean of an IU school.

There is perhaps another first: Dr. Gilmore may well be the only grad in IU's history to become the Association's president a month after earning his baccalaureate degree.

Baccalaureate degree?

Any way you slice it, Bill Gilmore took a circuitous route on his way to picking up a Bachelor of General Studies degree. Precisely 32 years after IU bestowed upon Dr. Gilmore the second of his two graduate degrees (the latter an MSD in operative dentistry), this long-time dentist, professor, and administrator went back to the basics, finishing requirements for the degree last summer after several years of part-time study.

The impetus for squeezing course work into an already jammed administrator's schedule was simple, says Dr. Gilmore: "I had enrolled in dental school after three years of undergraduate work and I've always regretted not getting the BS degree along with my DDS."

An educational goal that long outlived its practical purpose in terms of job advancement, attainment of the bachelor's degree gave this 60-year-old student something he feels is far more important at this stage in his life: a rich sense of personal fulfillment. Learning for the sheer joy of learning.

"I'm deeply honored to have received my education from IU, including this recent degree," he says. "I love the institution—and, besides that, IU offers one of the best educations in the world."

Enrolling primarily in literature, mathematics, and business courses, Dr. Gilmore didn't let on to teachers or classmates that he was IU's dean of dentistry (although some eventually found out). Taking mostly night courses after work, Dr. Gilmore usually showed up for class wearing his dean's duds. "I think a lot of the people I met

sized me up as someone with a pretty decent job downtown," he recalls with a laugh.

Just as often, however, he felt as if he blended well into IUPUI's tapestry since the Indianapolis campus is well-known for attracting a large number of nontraditional students. He aimed for a low profile. "I took my role of student seriously," he emphasizes, "buying my notebooks, sharpening my pencils, and underlining key textbook passages along with everyone else. I've saved all my notes."

With IU's recent launching of a \$4 million campaign for an Alumni Center, Dr. Gilmore finds himself presiding over the Alumni Association at a pivotal point in its history.

Although one or two of his younger professors seemed a bit uncomfortable when they learned that the dean of dentistry had taken a seat smack-dab in the middle of their class, Dr. Gilmore was pleased overall with the relationships he developed with teachers and students alike. "Everyone was friendly and supportive," he says. "And one professor was thrilled that a man of my age had an interest in his field of trigonometry!"

Generation gaps were few, and narrow. "I noticed them most in my American lit classes, especially when we interpreted poetry," he says. "Judging from individual perceptions of the meaning of one poem, for example, I counted three distinct age groups among us."

With more than eight years to his credit as dentistry's dean, Dr. Gilmore can't resist casting an administrative eye on his recent stint as an undergraduate. "It heightened my awareness of the challenges and pressures our dental students face daily," he says, "and reinforced my belief that the faculty and administration must be acutely sensitive to the student environment and the need for providing outstanding student services."

Knowledge he acquired in some of his business courses also threw a bit of extra light on the dental school's recent development of an economic model, helping Dr. Gilmore gain further insight into this pioneering process of comprehensive budget

analysis and management that other schools and divisions within the University are now beginning to follow.

Occupying seats on both sides of the desk in higher education has been a boon to Dr. Gilmore as he pursues his year-long duties as president of the IU Alumni Association. He likens the job to the one he had in 1964-65 as president of the dental school's alumni association. "This presidency, of course, is much broader in scope," he explains. "The alumni ask a lot of questions about diverse topics related to the University. I've found the club members I've met throughout the state to be extremely dedicated to IU, and deeply concerned about the future of higher education in Indiana."

With IU's recent launching of a \$4 million campaign for an Alumni Center, Dr. Gilmore finds himself presiding over the Alumni Association at a pivotal point in its history. The University's first center for alumni, scheduled for completion in 1996, will be located in Bloomington at 1000 E. 17th Street, across the street from Assembly Hall. It is named for IU alumnus Virgil T. DeVault (BS'27, MD'29, ScD'77), a Washington, D.C., resident who has kicked off the campaign with a gift of \$1.5 million in the form of a challenge grant.

"It's an exciting time to be a part of this organization," says Dr. Gilmore. "In addition to participating in the fundraising effort, I want to do whatever I can during my term to increase the vision of the Alumni Association of this great University."

For Bill Gilmore, that vision undoubtedly will be fortified by his personal definition of education. In his view, learning doesn't end when the lecture series is over, when the last credit hour is earned, when the sheepskin finally goes up on the wall.

Those are mere cues that it's time to move on, to explore new topics.

Bill Gilmore, an alumnus three times over, isn't sitting at home resting on his educational laurels. You can find him instead heading off to a Monday-night IUPUI economics class during spring semester.




Fall Conference continued

The following pages offer a look back at the '93 conference, including remarks from the individuals who were honored at the 51st Celebration Luncheon.





Otto P. Sturzenberger (DDS'59) Cincinnati Distinguished Alumnus



This outstanding dentist and longtime researcher for the Procter & Gamble Co. earned his first degree in dentistry from the University of Würzburg, in southcentral Germany, in 1950. At various times throughout his noteworthy career he has worked clinically in the U.S.

and in Mexico, Canada, England, Germany, Denmark, and Switzerland. For more than 40 years Dr. Sturzenberger has maintained an excellent record in clinical dental testing and is lauded today for his significant contributions in maintaining the working relationship between Procter & Gamble and the IU School of Dentistry. In addition to his own significant contributions to dental research, he has been instrumental in training a large number of clinical examiners. Dr. Sturzenberger has published more than 20 articles.

Remarks: In accepting this award, I gratefully recognize the role that IU and the Alumni Association have played in my career development in the United States.

After completing my dental training in West Germany and practicing there briefly, I came to the U.S. with my family in 1952 so I could pursue a more gratifying career. Since at that time I did not satisfy state board requirements, I joined the dental research organization of the Procter & Gamble Co. in Cincinnati. Our work involved the study of the function and benefit of dentifrices and mouth rinses in the laboratory, in experimental animals, and in humans.

In 1957, I was able to enroll in a special program to study at the IU School of Dentistry. With the help and understanding of many persons—in particular Drs. Maynard Hine, Drex Boyd, John Johnston, William Shafer, and Ralph Phillips—I graduated in 1959. In the meantime, I obtained my U.S. citizenship, which finally qualified me for state board examinations. My family and I moved back to Cincinnati, where I rejoined P&G and established a part-time private practice.

In the area of clinical research of caries and periodontal disease, a number of possible remedies dominated my activities, the trials of which were often done in collaboration with IU researchers (e.g., Drs. Joseph Muhler, George Stookey, Mark Mallatt, Bradley Beiswanger, and Roger Isaacs). My work was fruitful because of my good fortune to work with good people.

I am grateful for my selection for this award. Without the goodwill and fair judgment of so many persons, among them fellow dentists, it would not have happened. The "foreign dentist" of 1952 could not have achieved this honor or the pleasant life and retirement that I am enjoying. I shall not forget IU and the dental alumni.

Richard C. Harris (DDS'55) Wabash Distinguished Alumnus



Dr. Richard Harris earns tribute from his colleagues for service to his community and for his outstanding contributions to and support of dentistry and the IU Alumni Association.

During his distinguished career Dr. Harris has played an integral role in his community, having been the driving force in the fluoridation of the Wabash city water supply in the late 1950s. He is a former member of the board of directors of the Wabash County Society for Crippled Children and of Kiwanis International. Dr. Harris is also a past president of the Wabash Valley and the Grant County dental societies. He served a six-year term on the Indiana State Board of Dental Examiners. Dr. Harris received the American Dental Association's service award for his work related to dental missions in Honduras. He was Wabash Valley Dental Society's Honor Dentist in 1985. In 1992 he received a Donated Dental Service Award for providing services to medically compromised persons in need through a program created by the Indiana Dental Association and Indiana Foundation of Dentistry for the Handicapped.

Remarks: I am extremely happy and very humbled to be nominated for and to have received this award. I am certain that there are many others more deserving, but I am equally as certain that no one loves IU more than I.

From my first year at the Bloomington campus in 1945 until the present, IU has been foremost in my loyalties. I have always felt I could have received no better dental education than the one offered by IU.

Each day of my practice these names came into my mind: Drs. Maynard Hine, Drexell Boyd, Frank Hughes, Robert Derry, John Johnston, Ralph McDonald, Frederick Hohlt, Samuel Patterson, Harry Healey, Henry Swenson, William Shafer, and Ralph Phillips. I thought of these IU teachers because every day I used something I learned from each one of them. And the excellence of "our" school continues under the guidance of Dr. Bill Gilmore.

I would urge all alumni of IUSD to belong to the Alumni Association and support the school in any way possible.

Thanks for a very memorable day in my life.

John C. Gorman, Sr. Marion Honorary Alumnus



This honor was awarded posthumously to orthodontist, researcher, and teacher Dr. John "Jack" C. Gorman, whose death on July 12, 1993, deeply saddened dental professionals throughout Indiana.

Dr. Gorman received his dental training from the University of Louisville ('59) and his orthodontic training

from Washington University ('62), St. Louis. Having practiced briefly with his father, the late Dr. Marion Gorman, in Louisville, Jack went into private practice in Marion in 1962.

Dr. Gorman taught orthodontics at Washington University until 1990, when he joined IUSD as a part-time faculty member.

His special interest in orthodontics was invisible braces, which he helped develop in the early 1980s. He published more than a dozen papers about the subject and gave more than 50 lectures in the U.S. and abroad. He also presented courses to orthodontists in France, Germany, Austria, Italy, Switzerland, South Africa, and Japan.

His numerous leadership positions included terms as president of the IDA ('87), the Grant County Dental Association ('65, '76), the Wabash Valley Dental Society ('69), and the Marion Chamber of Commerce. He directed the Charles H. Tweed Foundation for Orthodontic Research and the American Lingual Orthodontic Association. He was a fellow of the American College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists. At the time of his death Dr. Gorman was president-elect of the Great Lakes Association of Orthodontists.

Long recognized for his outstanding contributions to dentistry, Dr. Gorman received Wabash Valley Dental Society's Dentist of the Year award in 1988. The Marion Chapter of the American Business Women's Association selected him as Boss of the Year in 1976. He was an honorary member of Groupe D'Etude d'Orthodontic Linguale in Paris and honorary chair of the first International Lingual Orthodontic Congress.

Dr. Gorman is survived by his wife, Faye Russell Cozart Gorman; sons, J. Courtney Jr. and Edward Russell; and daughter, Kathleen Gilbert.

Remarks (given by the award recipient's son, Dr. Courtney Gorman, IUSD Class of '87, of Marion): During the months since the death of my father our family has become acutely aware of how much he was appreciated and respected by his peers and colleagues. The outpouring of love from his dental family has been a comfort to us all.

My father spent his life in the pursuit of excellence. He once began a letter to me with the words, "Most important is to strive for the highest quality result in **every** patient." This was how he felt about everything. Whether in sports, family life, teaching, or in the treatment of his patients, Dad did his best, for not to do so was to cheat himself as well as others.

Dad loved his profession. He gave all he could to assist in its betterment. He served in local, state, national, and interna-

tional dental and orthodontic governing bodies and he enjoyed the time he gave so freely.

I know my father would have been proud to be recognized by the IU Alumni Association, though he was not an alumnus. Dad truly felt a close bond with the school, its students, and faculty. His positive outlook on life and orthodontics easily rubbed off on others. I am sure he will be dearly missed by those who came in contact with him.

Philip C. Rake (DDS'71, MSD'89) Zionsville Distinguished Faculty Award for Teaching



After spending his undergraduate years at Johns Hopkins University and IU-Bloomington, Dr. Rake graduated with honors from IU's dental program. He was appointed to the IU faculty in 1975 and is currently an assistant professor of prosthodontics in the newly established Department of Restorative Dentistry.

Dr. Rake's memberships include the American College of Prosthodontists and the American Association of Dental Schools. As a graduate of

IU's master's program in prosthodontics, Dr. Rake also belongs to one of the University's widely-known alumni groups, the John F. Johnston Society.

Dr. Rake's career in teaching and service is most impressive. The list of predoctoral and postdoctoral courses he has taught or administered is lengthy, and through those courses he has developed a reputation for developing outstanding rapport with his students. The DDS Class of '85 honored him with the Outstanding Full-time Instructor Award, and the DDS Class of '93 bestowed upon him the Outstanding Laboratory Instructor Award.

Dr. Rake spent much of the past year presiding over the new restorative dentistry department as acting chair while a national search was under way to fill the position.

Remarks: I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the Alumni Association for selecting me as recipient of this award. To be recognized by my peers in such a way is a most gratifying experience.

When I began teaching 18 years ago I thought my stay at IUSD would be transitional (i.e., between my few years in the U.S. Public Health Service and a full-time practice in Indianapolis). Little did I realize the personal fulfillment I would come to feel in being associated with the fine young people who are our students.

For many of our students the challenge of four years of dental school coincides with other significant personal successes and failures, achievements and losses. It is a time of change and growth, emerging careers, changing family structures. Students, knowingly or not, look to the older adults around them for example, validation, and encouragement. To be included by students in their personal growth, to be asked the bigger questions, to be trusted with their feelings, to take time to have some fun—these are the daily occurrences that over the years have made me feel so privileged to be at our school.

To you, our alumni, I would like to say that I am by no means alone in my feelings. We the faculty at your school are fully cognizant of our responsibility to prepare students to be knowledgeable, skillful dentists. However, we also hope to provide an environment that maximizes each individual's personal potential and a school of which you can be justly proud. The Alumni Association's annual recognition of worthy faculty further demonstrates the commitment we all—students, faculty, and alumni alike—share with one another. I thank you again for your generous recognition of my small contribution.

W. Eugene Roberts Indianapolis Distinguished Faculty Award for Research



The accomplishments of this gifted teacher and researcher were featured in the preceding (Fall '93) issue of the *Alumni Bulletin*, in which it was announced that Dr. Roberts had been appointed chair of IUSD's new Department of Oral Facial Development

Dr. Roberts holds a DDS degree from Creighton University ('67) and a PhD in

anatomy from the University of Utah ('69). He received his orthodontic training from the University of Connecticut.

Before accepting a position as chair of orthodontics at IU in 1988, Dr. Roberts was a longtime professor of orthodontics and director of the bone research laboratory at the University of the Pacific in San Francisco. With approximately 140 publications and numerous international presentations to his credit, Dr. Roberts is currently pursuing research interests in the areas of bone physiology, mineral metabolism, and biomechanics and space biology.

Remarks: It is a distinct pleasure to accept this award. To be honored by one's peers is a special privilege.

I am particularly pleased that this award is for research because scholarly accomplishment in original investigation is often the most difficult area of professional development for dental educators. I was no exception! Early in my career I fell into the trap of involving myself so deeply in development of teaching methods, clinical skills, and professional service that I neglected research development. As usual the excuse was "there was not enough time." Dr. Gunnar Ryge, an important research mentor in my career, pointed out that I had plenty of time but I did have a time management problem. Research achievement is an essential aspect of balanced academic development.

Academics is a three-legged stool: teaching, research, and service. No matter how successful one is in the primary area, an inadequate performance in one or both of the others constitutes incomplete professional development. Career educators must carefully budget time to allow coordinated accomplishment in all three areas. Teaching, clinical practice, and community service help researchers focus on significant problems. A career educator can never fully develop as a teacher and/or an innovative clinician without careful "investing" in original investigation to advance the field as well as his or her perspective of it.

Charles M. Simons (DDS'68, MSD'75) Kokomo Certificate of Appreciation



As one of IU's most loyal supporters, Dr. Simons richly deserves the 1993 Certificate of Appreciation.

After earning a bachelor's degree as a Rector Scholar from DePauw University in 1964, Dr. Simons completed his dental and orthodontic training at IU. His education in dentistry helped prepare him for a prestigious career as a practitioner and leader in

the dental community. Having practiced orthodontics in Kokomo since 1970, Dr. Simons also has satellite offices in Peru and Frankfort. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Orthodontics.

Dr. Simons served as president of the IDA in 1991-92 and is a former president of the Indiana Association of Orthodontists as well as the Howard County and Wabash Valley dental societies and the Great Lakes Association of Orthodontics, an organization that covers five states and one Canadian province. In 1989 he cochaired the annual session of the American Association of Orthodontists in Anaheim, Calif. Dr. Simons serves as vice regent for the 7th District of the International College of Dentists and is a fellow of the American College of Dentists and a member of the Pierre Fauchard Academy.

Dr. Simons' diverse interests in his community include leadership roles in such groups as the Rotary Club, the Kokomo Symphonic Society, Inc., and the United Way. He has served the limit of two terms of a gubernatorial appointment to the Indiana Arts Commission, and has twice received Sagamore of the Wabash honors from Indiana governors.

Dr. Simons is a charter member of the IDA/IUSD Pursuit of Excellence endowment program and has contributed to IU's Wells Scholar Committee, named for IU Chancellor Herman B Wells.

Remarks: I am proud to have received this honor, especially when I stop to realize how many alumni have done so much. This recognition is one I truly treasure. I thank my wife and family for supporting my participation in the world of dentistry beyond just earning a living and in whatever small contributions I have been able to make to dentistry and IU. The real pleasure has been in working with all of you and in realizing your true friendship. I look not at my own achievements, but rather at those of others and hope that in some small way I may have served as a catalyst to enable and empower others to more fully realize their own true potential in this our great profession of dentistry as well as in our communities at large.

In my years of practicing dentistry I have seen tremendous advancements in technology, diagnosis, and treatment modalities. I have seen the entrance of government and third parties structure of organized dentistry, and even new diseases. These have required adaptation and changes by the individual practitioner as well as by organized dentistry and our educational institutions. No Hearth, No Home

A new program for IU dental students challenges them to see dentistry through the eyes of patients whose daily routine includes a search for shelter.

Like some of the patients Rusty Dowden has treated at the Indiana University dental school, his first patient at People's Health Center came to him with a toothache.

Unlike his typical school patients, however, this woman has a problem that overwhelms her need for dental care: She is homeless.

"We all think about homeless persons in theory," says Mr. Dowden, who is in his final year of dental school. "But I don't think you really understand what homeless means until you see it for yourself."

The dual mission of a collaborative effort between People's Health Center and IUSD is to provide free dental care for homeless persons while heightening the sense of community awareness and service in students who will soon be embarking on their careers in the healthcare field.

Mr. Dowden and his classmate Cynthia Hovey were the first IU predoctoral students to be assigned to the dental clinic at People's Health Center, which is located in a near-eastside neighborhood about three miles from the school. The Center is one of several sites throughout Indianapolis where second-year dental hygiene students have been gaining experience with homeless and other underserved populations.

During the 1993-94 school year each member of the fourth-year dental class will spend at least one half-day offering a wide range of dental services as well as emergency care to homeless persons on-site at the Center to fulfill a community service requirement for graduation.

The program has been made possible in part with People's Health Care for the Homeless grant, which provides comprehensive primary healthcare to homeless men, women, and children in Marion County. The primary service area is Center Township, and patients are appointed through People's Homeless Initiative Program, headed by Lena Hackett.


In an orientation program for the students Matias Vega, MD, the Homeless Initiative Program's physician, described a homeless population in Indiana that grows increasingly younger each year, with numbers of homeless women, children, and minorities on the rise. Estimates of the state capital's homeless population range from about 2,000 to 6,000 persons.

The idea for the program stemmed from the dental school's involvement in Marion County's annual health fair for homeless persons in December 1992, when dental and dental hygiene faculty and students provided oral health screenings to 277 persons at shelters throughout the city. IUSD's Community Outreach Team, headed by Dr. Arden G. Christen, used the data collected at the fair to examine the possibility of adding a similar or expanded outreach experience to the dental curriculum.

Mr. Dowden and Ms. Hovey treated five patients at the first free clinic. "We kept them busy," says Matthew C. Moeller (DDS'85), a part-time IU faculty member who directs the new student outreach effort. Having been a staff dentist at People's for eight years, Dr. Moeller is well attuned to patient needs in the community and is confident that the dental students will benefit from the experience as much as the patients. "Patients here are grateful for services provided them," he says. "And students see they are making a significant contribution."

Mr. Dowden agrees. "It's a good experience for us, and it's fulfilling a real need in the community."



Drs. Jennifer Kugar and Matthew Moeller have combined their expertise as public health dentists and part-time IU faculty members to create a unique outreach program for IU's dental students.

Poor oral conditions impact the overall health of homeless persons as well as their ability to survive the streets, says Jennifer R. Kugar (DDS'88), People's dental director and a part-time IU faculty member. "Dental distress is widespread in a population whose inability to seek care is compounded by fear and a lack of resources, transportation, and providers from whom to receive care. Dental problems can even interfere with opportunities for employment."

People's staff dentists acquaint students with the objectives and philosophies of public health dental facilities during the training

sessions. Students also learn to provide dental health education to the patients they see.

"Public health dentistry is a rewarding component of the profession," says Dr. Moeller, who is proud of the Center's outstanding dental clinic and hopes that the students' exposure to it will help do away with the often-held student belief that public health dentistry is conducted in run-down facilities.

"Public health dentistry is an essential component of a well-rounded dental education," says Dr. Kugar. "Early introduction to this topic in a student's career helps produce an informed and caring practitioner who has a strong sense of community service and a greater understanding of the needs of underserved populations."

Mr. Dowden acknowledges the difficulty of motivating patients to care about the condition of their teeth when they are facing overwhelming problems associated with life in the streets. During the first clinic, for example, one patient did not wish to appear in any photos because she said she was being stalked by her husband. Some of the other scheduled patients never arrived at all.

But Mr. Dowden believes his classmates will find, as he did, that homeless patients often share the same concerns as any other person sitting in the dental chair. "The patients I met at People's talked about their teeth, about their kids—they were just like anyone else," he says. "There are those who will come to this clinic only because they are in pain. But others will come because they want to save their dentition, and because they want to know more about themselves. It's difficult to talk to *anyone* about preventive techniques if they aren't interested—and that includes some of the well-off patients I've seen at the school."

Second-year students also have been volunteering their time with the homeless population of Indianapolis, including one group that has undertaken a class project and table clinic designed to recruit volunteers to help homeless persons. An ongoing effort for second-year students is their involvement at the People's Health Center, which provides dental care for those in financial need. In cooperation with the Student American Dental Hygienists' Association, students also organized a food drive for the homeless and sponsored a family during the holiday season.

The dental hygiene faculty also has been busy throughout the last semester. R. With the Classes . . .

Saying Goodbye to Two Leaders

Two emeritus professors who helped train thousands of IU School of Dentistry students die within a few hours of one another



Robert H. Derry

There were only two photos on the obituary page of the *Indianapolis Star* on October 16, 1993. The stark reality of the pictures greatly startled and saddened anyone with ties to the IU School of Dentistry.

Two Indianapolis community leaders were dead—Dr. Robert H. Derry and Dr. Samuel S Patterson. Here at 1121 West Michigan Street, they also were regarded as pioneers in the dental profession.

Dr. Derry, who died on October 14, devoted more than four decades to his career as an IU professor of prosthodontics. A native of New London, Conn., he graduated from the Medical College of Virginia's dental program in 1940. Dr. Derry joined the faculty in 1944 and chaired the Complete Denture Department from 1973 until 1979. He served as acting chair from 1979 until his retirement from the full-time faculty in 1984. He remained on the part-time faculty until 1988.

In addition to his work with predoctoral and graduate students, Dr. Derry left his mark in the pages of IU's history by assuming a trail-blazing role as first director of dental continuing education, a post he held for nearly 20 years. Under his direction IUSD presented award-winning CE exhibits at the American Dental Association annual session for several years.

Dr. Derry was named a Sagamore of the Wabash by then Governor Otis R. Bowen. Dr. Derry was a fellow of the American

College of Dentists and the International College of Dentists (ICD), and a member of the Pierre Fauchard Academy. He was a former president of the Indianapolis District Dental Society (IDDS), Omicron Kappa Upsilon dental honor society, the Indiana Section of the ACD, and the Indiana Public Health Association (IPHA).

He was a recipient of the IPHA President's Recognition Award, the Alpha Omega dental fraternity's Award for Excellence in Continuing Education, and the Faithful Service Award from the IDDS. He also was an honorary alumnus of the IUSD Alumni Association.

Throughout his busy career in academics, Dr. Derry also maintained a private practice that he established in 1947.

Dr. Derry is survived by his wife, Elizabeth ("Lib"); daughters Linda Kolb and Betsy Jeatran, both of Indianapolis; and two grandchildren.



Although Dr. Samuel Patterson had resigned from his position as IU's chair of endodontics several years ago, he had continued to practice endodontics at St. Vincent Hospital Professional Building on the northwest side and was in his 53rd year of practice at the time of his death on October 15.

A lifelong resident of Indianapolis, Dr. Patterson graduated from IUSD in 1940.

He was a veteran of World War II, having served as an officer in the U.S. Army Dental Corps.

Dr. Patterson originally was appointed to the faculty in 1949 as an instructor in operative dentistry (he had arrived before the endodontic department was formed). Early research in pulp capping medicaments that he conducted with Dr. Harry J. Healey (who preceded Dr. Patterson as head of endodontics) led to the development of IU's Department of Endodontics in 1953. In 1960 he completed requirements for IU's MSD degree in endodontics. By 1970 he was head of the graduate endodontic program and in 1973 he assumed the chair of the Department of Endodontics, a position he stepped down from in 1982. He was awarded the emeritus title in 1985.

Dr. Patterson also served as a consultant for the Veterans Administration Hospital and on the medical staff of IU Medical Center and St. Vincent Hospital.

Dr. Patterson was a diplomate of the American Board of Endodontics and a highly respected national figure in his field. He was a past president of the American Association of Endodontists and a 1989 recipient of the organization's prestigious Edgar D. Coolidge Award, given for his leadership skills and dedication to endodontics. He also served terms as president of the Indiana Association of Endodontists and the IDDS. He was a two-time president of the Indianapolis alumni chapter of Alpha Omega, a member of OKU, and a fellow of the American and International colleges of dentists.

Among his numerous honors are the Indiana Dental Association's Maynard K. Hine Award for distinguished contributions to the dental profession, Alpha Omega's International Certificate of Merit, and the IDDS Honor Dentist of the Year recognition.

Dr. Patterson had shared a dental office with his son, Steven M. Patterson (DDS'81, MSD'84/Endodontics). Dr. Patterson is also survived by his wife, Eunice; son, Dr. Alan B. Patterson; and a granddaughter.

Dr. Mollenkopf Dies at 58

Faculty, staff, and students were deeply saddened by the death on September 12, 1993, of part-time faculty member Jack P. Mollenkopf (DDS'61), Lafayette.

Dr. Mollenkopf was appointed to the IU faculty in 1972, serving with distinction as an assistant professor of preventive and community dentistry. A popular teacher who often supervised student field training through the school's course in community dentistry, he also had conducted a full-time general practice in Lafayette and had served as a dental consultant for the Indiana State Department of Health for more than 30 years.

Dr. Mollenkopf's many contributions during his career with the Department of

Health included designing and conducting dental surveys for elementary schools throughout Indiana. He also was an authority on traumatic injuries to the oral cavity and issues related to sports dentistry.

Dr. Mollenkopf held a number of leadership positions in dentistry, including terms as president of the West Central Dental Society and the IUSD Alumni Association. Last year he was secretary-treasurer of the Indiana Section of the American College of Dentists.

Dr. Mollenkopf was the son of the late Jack Mollenkopf, who was head football coach at Purdue University in the 1950s. Dr. Mollenkopf is survived by his wife, Susan; daughter, Jennifer; and son, Jack Jr.

Former Indianapolis resident Albert L. Pushor (DDS) died July 14, 1993. He had practiced for 49 years in North Dakota and in Columbus, Ind., before retiring in 1971.

Dr. Pushor was preceded in death by his wife, Mary. He is survived by sons, John A. and Lawrence M.; daughters Mary Ruth Moebius, Jacqueline A. MacGibbon, and Patricia L. Mosteller; 26 grandchildren; and 34 great-grandchildren.

The study chronicled the years of care and the dental health of patients Dr. Kepic presented to the ABP to earn diplomate status. Using the most current diagnostic techniques in DNA probing and bacterial culturing, he demonstrated that "even patients with advanced periodontal disease are treatable and can be maintained over a long period."

Dr. Kepic added a second lecture at the University of Geneva entitled "Total Patient Customer Service." Says Dr. Kepic: "We know that some 50 percent of the U.S. population does not see a dentist regularly most only when they have an emergency. Simple considerations, such as listening to what the patient says about himself or herself—past dental experiences, fears about discomfort, questions about procedures, and even how the treatment plan can fit into budget constraints—really count with patients... This, of course, takes more time from the dental team, but making our patients comfortable is as important as providing care since secure patients are more likely to return for followup and monitoring."

Dr. Kepic practices in Upland, which is near San Bernardino. He has been published in the *Journal of Periodontology* and has presented additional programs in Portugal and Vancouver, British Columbia.

E.B. Hancock Named Chair of New Dept

As the national search continues for faculty to head the IU School of Dentistry's six newly created departments, Dean H. William Gilmore has announced that IU faculty member Dr. E. Brady Hancock has been appointed to chair the Department of Periodontics and Allied Dental Programs, effective immediately.

Dr. Hancock had chaired IU's former Department of Periodontics since 1987, when he retired with the rank of Captain in the U.S. Navy's Dental Corp. He is a recipient of the Navy's Meritorious Service Medal.

Faculty positions Dr. Hancock held during his 20-year military career include appointments at the universities of Oregon, Illinois, and Maryland, and the Naval Dental School at Bethesda, Md.

Born in Centralia, Ill., Brady Hancock earned a bachelor's degree ('64) and dental degree ('67) from the University of Illinois, Chicago. He also completed a postdoctoral fellowship ('72) in periodontics at the Naval Dental Clinic at Long Beach, Calif., and a master's degree ('74) in periodontics at Indiana University.

A decade ago Dr. Hancock attained diplomate status in the American Board of Periodontology. He was president of the Indiana Society of Periodontists in 1991-92, and has served on various committees of the American Academy of Periodontology. He has been a reviewer for the *Journal of Periodontology* for 15 years.

In the mid-1980s Dr. Hancock was a consultant in the oral biology and medicine study section of the Scientific Review Branch, Division of Research Grants, for the National Institutes of Health. He has been a consultant in periodontics for the American Dental Association's Commission on Dental Accreditation for the past five years.

Dr. Hancock's research grants and awards include a current investigation of a slow release antibiotic placed in a periodontal pocket as part of the treatment for adult periodontitis.

Dr. Hancock is a member of Omicron Kappa Upsilon dental honor society and a fellow of the American College of Dentists. He has lectured throughout the United States as well as in Canada and Japan, and is a frequent contributor to the periodontic literature.

Dental Impressions

An Englishman Compares Training Programs at Indiana and Manchester

The Agreement of Friendship and Cooperation between dental schools at the University of Manchester, United Kingdom, and Indiana University continues to flourish through a popular predoctoral student exchange program.

In the latest crisscrossing of the Atlantic, IU sent classmates Tony Ratliff and Douglas Jansen (DDS'94) to the University of Manchester for several weeks of training last summer, and their trip was followed up by the arrival in Indy of Manchester students Valerie Swann and Amanda Taylor, who devoted nine weeks in the fall to studies here.

In March 1993, the IU dental school was honored by a visit from F.J.T. Burke, senior lecturer in dental practice at the University of Manchester. When Mr. Burke returned to England, he jotted down and sent to us his impressions of the differences and similarities between our schools.

Mr. Burke provides us a rare opportunity to get an "inside" look at ourselves from an "outside" source, and he also shares interesting details about what school is like for dental students at Manchester. We are grateful for his report, which follows:

For the past 15 years at the University Dental Hospital of Manchester, comprehensive patient care has been taught during the last six months of the training program. It's been part of the overall final year course known as the Pre-Registration Course.

The school plans to expand comprehensive patient care to the whole of the final year beginning in 1994, and so it seemed reasonable to visit a school where comprehensive care was the hub around which the program was built. As I was visiting Chicago, where better than nearby Indianapolis? So, in mid-March I arrived, after what must be the worst value plane ride ever—\$175 for 40 minutes!

Indiana University's dental school was, I thought, a striking building with the outstanding feature (and that of the campus as a whole) being spaciousness, which is not surprising when one considers that in the UK, 56 million of us live in an area of 94,000 square miles, compared to 250 million of you living in 3.6 million square miles of space!

Dr. Donald Tharp, associate dean for clinical affairs, generously gave his time to explain the "modus operandi" of your cluster system, which seems to be an excellent arrangement, much favoured by everyone to whom I spoke. The computerised patient/student management system was similarly impressive (something like that in Manchester would make my job much easier, I thought). I realised that the computer system had a number of roles, one being the management of patient payments, which is one worry that we do not have in Manchester, as all treatment is free. In that respect, I was amazed to find that the fees charged by undergraduates at IU were higher than many of the fees paid by the National Health Service (a treatment system partly funded by central government) to qualified dentists in practice in the UK!

In Manchester, departmental teaching is completed at the end of the fourth year, when the students sit Finals Part I, which covers theoretical and practical knowledge of all disciplines. Satisfactory performance in that exam allows progress into the Pre-Registration Course, which covers three modules—Comprehensive Patient Care, The Dentist in the Community, and Research Methods. Throughout the course, Manchester's final-year students spend three sessions per week in the Comprehensive Patient Care Clinic, this being considerably less than the time spent on patient treatment by final-year students in Indianapolis. However, the Manchester students see two to three patients per session, while my impression was that the Indianapolis students tended to see only one patient per session. (IU's students are permitted to treat as many patients per session as they are comfortable with and typically do see more than one patient as they gain more experience—ed.)

The Manchester students spend a further two sessions per week treating patients in community clinics, which are at sites remote to the dental school and often in areas of high-treatment need. Students are expected to see five or six patients per session, with dental surgery assistant help; we feel that this adds an element of time management to the course and is the closest experience to general practice that we can provide.

So how do the Manchester students spend the rest of their time? Each devotes one session per week to a clinical elective—a specialist course—examples of subjects offered being advanced crown and bridge, aesthetic dentistry, apical surgery, and sedation. Another weekly session is taken up by a research elective, which takes the form of a literature review and research project. It is hoped that this part of the course will encourage graduates to think about research during their practicing careers. The remaining time is spent on lectures, seminars, and private study.

Despite the differences between the two programs, I am sure that both have a common objective, namely to turn out groups of thinking, caring professionals.

My short visit to the IU dental school was both interesting and enjoyable and hopefully will lead not only to more student exchanges but also to cooperative research efforts of benefit to both schools.

I made one mistake! Having visited the racetrack, I now ask: If there are to be any further visits, can I schedule them for the end of May?

Dr. Swenson Receives AAP's Presidential Award

Henry M. Swenson, Indianapolis, a periodontist and parttime professor of periodontics who has been a member of IU's dental faculty since 1945, is this year's recipient of the American Academy of Periodontology's Presidential Award.

This distinguished service award, funded by Procter & Gamble Company, was presented at the Academy's annual meeting in Chicago last September.

Throughout his career, Dr. Swenson has served on numerous AAP committees and the Executive Council. He was a member of the committee that oversaw the merger of the AAP and American Society of Periodontists in 1967.

Dr. Swenson served as AAP president, and as secretary and treasurer of the American Board of Periodontology (ABP) for two years.

A diplomate of the ABP, Dr. Swenson is a former president of the Indiana Society of Periodontology and the Midwest Society of Periodontology.

In 1985 Dr. Swenson received the AAP's Gold Medal Award, the highest honor bestowed by the Academy.

Dr. Swenson is a 1942 dental graduate of the University of Illinois at Chicago; he completed his training in periodontics at the Medical College of Virginia in 1943.

Faculty Retirements Announced

Two outstanding faculty members of the IU School of Dentistry announced their retirements effective December 1993.

Rolando A. DeCastro, professor of oral anatomy and director of dental art, brought his dental career to a close after filling a unique position on the IUSD faculty for 25 years.

Originally from Manila in the Philippines, Dr. DeCastro received his dental degree from Manila Central University in 1953. He was appointed in 1968 by then dean Maynard K. Hine to serve as the school's first dental illustrator, and was appointed director of art in 1975.

In 1973 Dr. DeCastro earned an IU master's degree in oral anatomy, the primary subject that he taught to IU's students of dentistry and dental auxiliary education. In 1981 he wrote for this publication about the impact of visual aids in dental health education. Always eager to share his love and knowledge of art with other people, Dr. DeCastro for many years volunteered his services as a teacher in an "after-school" class for dental school employees and students with an interest in learning.

During his career he provided illustrations for books, journals, brochures, newsletters, and all types of visual aids. Dr. DeCastro is an exceptionally talented and highly regarded textbook illustrator who has most recently worked on a book with Dr. Eugene Roberts, IU's chair of oral facial development.

Dr. DeCastro is best known to visitors of the school for his depiction of the history of dentistry that took form in the 1970s as a colorful mural stretching the entire length of a wall in the school's first-floor lobby. In 1981 IUSD's students presented Dr. DeCastro with a plaque as a token of their appreciation for the mural. Today the plaque hangs alongside the mural.

Dr. DeCastro has contributed numerous other works of art to IU, including countless faculty portraits and an oil painting of the patron saint of dentistry commissioned by the DDS Class of 1935 and given to the school as a gift. He devoted many hours to preparation of materials associated with the IUSD Fall Teaching Conference, an annual retreat that took place in the 1960s-'80s.

A fund-raising effort sponsored by the Women's Auxiliary of the Indianapolis District Dental Society led to Dr. DeCastro's creation in 1982 of "Germ City," a large, eye-catching dental health exhibit that originally was displayed in the prestigious Children's Museum in Indianapolis.

A few months before his retirement Dr. DeCastro was honored on the IUPUI campus with the Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., M.D. Experience Excellence Award, given for outstanding service.



Shelbyville resident Roberta M. Hilderbrand, associate professor of periodontics, served on the faculty for 21 years. She holds two IU degrees—an associate of science in dental hygiene, earned in 1971, and a bachelor of science in public health dental hygiene earned from the School of Medicine's division of allied health sciences in 1972.

Before her career in dentistry Professor Hilderbrand was employed in several pharmacies, including three years in a hospital pharmacy. In 1971-72 she practiced dental hygiene in the office of Larry M. Wadsworth (DDS'68), Greensburg.

First appointed to the faculty to work with periodontists Henry Swenson and the late Timothy O'Leary in the Plaque Control Program, Ms. Hilderbrand was promoted to associate professor in the Department of Periodontics in 1983.

Professor Hilderbrand pioneered IUSD's program in basic life support, coordinating the effort since it began in 1978. She is qualified to teach as well as train other teachers in basic life support. For many years she also offered a basic life support course through the school's continuing education division.

She is a member of the American Heart Association, Indiana Affiliate, and of the AHA Basic Life Support Task Force Committee.

Graduates of the dental school demonstrated their deep appreciation of this fine teacher's skill, dedication, and interest in the welfare of students by bestowing upon her the 1991 Distinguished Faculty Award for Teaching; the honor was announced during the 50th annual IUSD Fall Dental Alumni Conference in Bloomington.

Deans Welcome Newest Member of the Club

If Dr. Lawrence I. Goldblatt, newly appointed dean of dentistry at Case Western Reserve University, felt that he needed any advice about how to do his new job over in the Buckeye State, he had plenty of expert Hoosier advisers at hand during his farewell reception at the IU dental school last November.

Among the guests at the party for Dr. Goldblatt, longtime IU professor of oral pathology, were H. William Gilmore, current dean at IUSD; Dr. Gilmore's predecessor, Dean Emeritus Ralph E. McDonald, who held the position from 1968 to 1985 (the first year as acting dean); and Dr. McDonald's predecessor, Dean Emeritus Maynard K. Hine, who served in the post from 1945 to 1968.

Dr. Goldblatt, a dental alumnus of Georgetown University and 1973 graduate of IU's oral pathology program, had served with distinction on the IU dental faculty for two decades. He had been associate dean for graduate and postgraduate education since 1988 and for academic affairs since 1989.

Dr. Goldblatt's appointment at Case Western boosts the number of current U.S. and Canadian dental deans with ties to IU to five—and three of the group are grads of IU's oral pathology program (take note, Dr. Shafer!).

The other deans are Dr. Henry M. Cherrick, University of California at Los Angeles (MSD'70/Oral Pathology); Dr. Richard P. Elzay, University of Minnesota (DDS'60, MSD'62/Oral Pathology); and Dr. Ralph Y. Barolet, McGill University, Montreal, Quebec (MSD'72/Dental Materials).

Associate Deanships Reorganized in Restructuring Campaign

The recent departure of Lawrence I. Dr. Garner's new title is associate dean for minority student services and director of graduate programs.

Dean H. William Gilmore has assumed Dr. Goldblatt's former duties as chair of the graduate advisory committee and faculty development program.

After 16 years with the IU School of Dentistry, Evelyn R. Ritter didn't pick up a diploma. But she did earn the respect of both employees and students for her outstanding contributions as supervisor of patient accounts and cash operations, a position she retired from in October 1993.

Watching her son progress through his dental training from her front-row seat in the third-floor cashiers' window was one of the most memorable periods in Mrs. Ritter's career—and also one of the most difficult.

"I tried to keep my distance from John then," Evelyn reminisced shortly before her dental school retirement party. "I didn't want to be seen as having influenced any decisions regarding his training." And she left town altogether when it was time for John to take the Indiana boards.

A decade later, proud mother Ritter says that her son loves being a dentist and has a thriving practice. John has a thriving household as well—he and his wife have three children.

Evelyn and her husband, John, a retired postal worker, also have a daughter, Barbara, who lives in Indianapolis with her husband and child. Barbara has a degree in architecture from Indiana State University.

Evelyn originally was hired by IU in 1962 as cashier for clinics at Riley Hospital. But three years later the Ritters moved into a house that wasn't on the busline. "I couldn't drive, so I had to quit," Evelyn recalled. She wound up working often anyway, as a cashier substitute for the medical center. "They were willing to come and get me."

After passing a driver's ed course, Evelyn drove herself back to campus for another stint at Riley. Leaving to take a job as secretary to the dean of girls at Arlington High School, Evelyn returned to Riley in 1973 to a job in the orthotics department. She left that position in 1977 for a promotion at the dental school, where she remained until her retirement. As head cashier for dentistry Evelyn found a cashiering system in dire need of being overhauled in general—and computerized in particular. During the next two years she rolled up her sleeves and helped the administration design a new system for the school that has continued to evolve in its efficiency and sophistication over the years.

Evelyn pursued her work with an archeologist's sense of wonder. "I like to dig for details," she said in her soft-spoken voice. "And I like being able to right what I find wrong." Today's trip to the cashier by a dental student results in much more than the collection of a fee; every time a patient's ticket is rung up, an array of student data is automatically recorded, including progress toward graduation requirements.

Having worked for Indiana University 26 years altogether, Evelyn characterizes her career here as "an education" with just enough new challenges coming along at appropriate intervals to keep her interested.

And now that she's closed out the bank and tallied the cash receipts for the last time, Muskies of northern Wisconsin: Beware. Evelyn R. Ritter will be casting a line in your direction more frequently now that she and her husband have extra time to devote to the family cottage in Rhinelander. Catching the elusive muskellunge is but one of several retirement goals Evelyn has set for herself. With nine brothers and sisters and an assortment of other relatives spread out all over the country, Evelyn won't be running out of travel ideas anytime soon.

Just in case the pace gets too hectic, Evelyn is prepared to stop and raise the roses—one of her favorite hobbies for the past 28 years. Her specialty is "First Prize."

Clinical Research Facility launches studies, patient-recruitment campaign

With assistance from study coordinator Zoya Roberts (at right in photo below), principal investigator E. Retired persons are regarded by the research community as ideal candidates to assist with studies, says Dr. Matis. "They tend to be very committed to recognizing and fulfilling their responsibilities as participants in the research effort and they are among the most reliable in keeping appointments with us. I think many retired people enjoy knowing that they are contributing to science when they assist with a project. And they are."


The good news: Space shuttle Columbia successfully completed its 14-day mission, the longest shuttle flight in NASA's history.

The bad news: The shuttle sat instead of soared during the short time the Willises were in Florida.

With the flight cancelled during countdown on Columbia's first attempt at launch October 14, the shuttle finally went up on its third try October 18—after Dr. Willis was back on the job in Indy.

He was disappointed, but Dr. Willis made the most of his stay (and we are grateful to him for providing us with our first snapshot of one of IU's NASA researchers at work on a launch site). Dr. Garetto's NASA research teammate is Dr. W. Eugene Roberts, IU's chair of oral facial development, the department that oversees activities of the bone research laboratory.

After returning to Earth, the IU project was shipped back to Dr. Garetto's laboratory where it will spend months being analyzed. All of the projects aboard this flight, including IU's, were designed to help researchers study the effects weightlessness in space has on the human body.

Back by Popular Demand

Among numerous textbooks edited and written by the dental faculty at Indiana University over the years are five books that recently were re-launched in new editions.

One of the best-known dental textbooks in the country, *Dentistry for the Child and Adolescent*, has been issued in a 6th edition by Mosby-Year Book, Inc. Editors are Ralph E. McDonald, IU professor emeritus of pediatric dentistry, former chair of pediatric dentistry, and dean emeritus of the dental school; and David R. Avery, an IU professor of pediatric dentistry who chaired the department for 17 years.

The book, which runs more than 900 pages and includes 1,230 illustrations, has now caught up in number of editions with *Practical Pedodontia* (published 1924-1953), the longest running children's dentistry textbook in U.S. history.

The IU textbook was first published in 1969, serving as a much-expanded version of Dr. McDonald's original textbook, *Pedodontics*, published in 1963. Dr. Avery, who is a former student of Dr. McDonald's, became a co-editor with publication of the 3rd edition of *Dentistry for the Child and Adolescent*.

The book has been translated into Portuguese, Spanish, Japanese, Italian, and Hindi.

Twenty-six of the book's 36 contributors are members of the IU faculty.

The 2nd edition of *Oral Diagnosis, Oral Medicine, and Treatment Planning* has been 10 years in the making, says primary author Steven L. Bricker, an IU professor and former chair of dental diagnostic sciences. "This book is an extensively revised version of the original," he says. "It has doubled in size." Dr. Bricker's co-authors are Robert P. Langlais, a professor at the University of Texas Health Science Center, San Antonio, and 1975 graduate of IU's master's degree program in oral diagnosis/ oral medicine; and Craig S. Miller, University of Kentucky. The textbook is published by Lea & Febiger.

IUSD signs an agreement of friendship with the dental school at The University of Sydney

Australian Michael Constantine Kafalias (MSD'63) still recalls the youthful exuberance he felt when he arrived in distant America 33 years ago to soak up the experience of a new land and a new culture.

Fresh out of the University of Sydney's master's program in dental surgery, Michael had enrolled as a Fulbright Scholar in Dr. John F. Johnston's rigorous prosthodontic master's program at Indiana University.

He looked forward to exploring the wonders of America. With excitement and great curiosity he anticipated meeting his American classmates—comrades with whom he would count on for friendship and support. He knew that he and they would develop a special bond, sharing a thousand trials and tribulations on the road to their MSDs.

The partnership with The University of Sydney represents the 16th agreement IUSD has entered into with top-notch dental schools throughout the world.

Dr. Kafalias encountered his first brush with culture shock when he bumped into his first "American" classmate quite by accident on a walk to the campus's union building—it was fellow Aussie Patrick Joseph Henry, a dental graduate of the University of Western Australia, in Perth.

"Having traveled half way around the globe to study here, Patrick was not at all what I was expecting," Dr. Kafalias said with a laugh last summer when he returned to his alma mater to participate in the John F. Johnston Society conference. (Drs. Kafalias and Henry wound up as Hoosier roommates and have remained good friends since their IU school days.) As Dr. Kafalias soon learned during his first trip to Indiana, when it comes to undertaking graduate studies at IUSD, the world is a very small place indeed. Rounding out the class roster of incoming prosthodontic graduate students for 1961 were Donald FitzRoy, of Washington, D.C.; Charalambos Blazoudakis, of Greece; Sumiya Hobo, of Japan; Gabriel Thiruselvam Simon, of India; and Walter R. Teteruck, of Canada.

In addition to taking part in the 1993 Johnston meeting, an event that traditionally brings IU's prosthodontic alumni from throughout the world back to IUSD every other year, Dr. Kafalias pursued another mission last summer. On behalf of The University of Sydney's Faculty of Dentistry, Dr. Kafalias carried an Agreement of Friendship and Cooperation from Sydney's dental dean, Dr. Iven J. Klineberg, to IU's dental dean, Dr. H. William Gilmore, for a ceremonial signing.

The collaborative partnership with The University of Sydney's Westmead Hospital Dental Clinical School represents the 16th agreement IUSD has entered into with top-notch dental schools throughout the world.

"We are delighted to see this agreement with The University of Sydney come to fruition," Dean Gilmore said recently. "IU is especially proud of Mike, who plays a prominent role on Sydney's outstanding faculty. Through arrangements on his part, we already have been honored with a brief visit from three of Westmead's undergraduate students—Sabrina Manickam, Lyndall Mansley,

A program in dentistry was created at The University of Sydney in 1902, and its Faculty of Dentistry was established in 1919 (six years before IU purchased the Indiana Dental College). The coastal city of Sydney is the capital of New South Wales, located in the east-central part of the state on the Tasman Sea. With more than 3.6 million people, it is the nation's largest city.

One dental school serves the entire state, which has a population of 5 million. About 420 students are in training at Sydney to become dentists through the BDS degree program. This five-year course of study is in the process of being expanded to six years.

In addition to the predoctoral program, Sydney trains dental assistants through its hospital affiliation and offers graduate degrees in all specialties except endodontics. Degrees also are awarded in two non-specialty areas—pain control and clinical dentistry. A new hospital program for dental laboratory technologists got under way in July 1993.

The faculty comprises 163 teachers—33 full time, 120 part time, and 10 honorary. The research faculty's primary interests are biomaterials, orofacial pain and craniomandibular disorders, microbiology, cariology, and dental implants.

Graduates of The University of Sydney who have also trained at IU include Dr. John Kirkwood, a 1977 recipient of a certificate in periodontics who now resides in London. Dr. Husna Abbas, a senior dental officer for the Ministry of Health in Kuala Lumpur who earned a degree in public health dentistry from Sydney in 1982, recently spent a month at IU observing Indiana's public health system as a fellow of the World Health Organization.

Dr. Klineberg, a prosthodontist and longtime faculty member at Sydney, assumed the deanship of the Faculty of Dentistry in 1991 after having served as associate dean for graduate studies since 1988. He chaired the prosthetic dentistry department from 1978 to 1989. An honors graduate of Sydney (BDS'63/MDS'66), Dr. Klineberg also holds a PhD from the University of London ('71) and fellowship in dental surgery at the Royal College of Surgeons of England.

A lifelong resident of Sydney and two-time grad of The University of Sydney (BDS'59/MDS'61), Dr. Kafalias has been a member of the University's dental faculty since he earned his IU degree. In 1990 he was appointed associate dean for continuing education. Two years after leaving Indiana Dr. Kafalias earned fellowship status in the Royal Australasian College of Dental Surgeons.

In 1971, Dr. Kafalias came back to IU to serve one year as a visiting associate professor in the crown and bridge department. His skill as a teacher did not go unnoticed. For his efforts he received the Best Clinical Instructor of the Year award from IU's graduate and undergraduate students.

IU looks forward to seeing more of this illustrious alumnus now that the friendship agreement is sealed. Among Dr. Kafalias' good memories of Indiana was his winning of the Indiana State Open Squash Racquets Championship in 1972, shortly after serving as president of The University of Sydney's Squash Racquets Club. A gentleman of diverse talents, Dr. Kafalias also was first violinist for Sydney's North Shore Symphony Orchestra for more than two decades.
