

HONORARY DOCTORAL DEGREES HIGHLIGHT COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES

F ive honorary doctoral degrees will be among the nearly 4,000 degrees conferred during the 23rd IUPUI commencement ceremonies May 10 at the Hoosier Dome. Among those to be honored are: Washington Post columnist William James Raspberry (doctorate of humane letters degree); Joyce C. Clifford, vice president for nursing and nurse in chief of Beth Israel Hospital in Boston (doctor of science degree); Peter Fischer-Appelt, president emeritus of the University of Hamburg, Germany (doctor of laws degree); Henry A. Rosso, director of the Fund Raising School at the IU Center on Philanthropy (doctor of laws degree); and Anthony San Pietro, distinguished professor emeritus of plant biochemistry at IU and consultant to the vice chancellor for undergraduate education at IUPUI (doctor of science). San Pietro's degree will come from Purdue, while the rest are being conferred by IU.

Of the 3,923 degrees conferred during the 3 p.m. ceremonies, 3,086 are from IU and 837 are from Purdue. In addition to the university ceremonies, 17 schools and divisions will recognize graduates at separate ceremonies both before and after the commencement. The public is welcome to attend the commencement exercises. No tickets or reservations are required. —Alicia Dean Carlson

BOOKMARKS BALLOTS IN, '92-93 READING LIST SET






