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PAPANDREOU, EXILED GREEK LEADER, TO SPEAK TUESDAY

Andreas G. Papandreou, exiled Greek political leader and one of the world's renowned economists, will come to Indianapolis Tuesday to lecture on "Democracy and U.S. Foreign Policy: The Greek Case" at IUPUI.

The public lecture, sponsored by the IUPUI economics department, will be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Lecture Hall Building.

Dr. Papandreou has strong ties to the United States. After earning master's and doctor's degrees in economics at Harvard, he joined the U.S. Navy during World War II and became an American citizen.

Following the war, Dr. Papandreou taught at Harvard, the University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, and the University of California, where he served as chairman of economics.

Dr. Papandreou returned to Greece in 1959, resumed Greek citizenship, and entered politics. In 1964 he became a minister of state and a deputy in the Greek parliament. He rose to the post of Minister of Coordination in the Greek government and was serving in that post when a military junta overthrew the government in 1967.

Dr. Papandreou was among 3,000 political figures arrested by the junta as it took power. He was charged with treason, then released from prison to go into exile. More recently, Dr. Papandreou has been professor of economics at York University, Toronto.

As a scholar, Dr. Papandreou ranks with the world's foremost economists. In addition to numerous books and publications, he has been honored with Fulbright and Guggenheim fellowships.

As an exile, Dr. Papandreou has been active in opposition to the current Greek government. He is leader of the Panhellenic Liberation Movement and the foreign spokesman for the Center Union Party, one of his country's principal political parties.

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SOCIAL WORK-HOSPITALS WORKSHOP THIS WEEK

Dr. Hyman J. Weiner, associate professor and director, Industrial Welfare Center of the School of Social Work at Columbia University, will conduct a two-day workshop on administration in social work services Monday and Tuesday.

The workshop is funded by the Maternal and Child Health Services, U.S. Public Health Service of HEW. The Social Service Department of Riley Hospital for Children at IUPUI is hosting the workshop.
