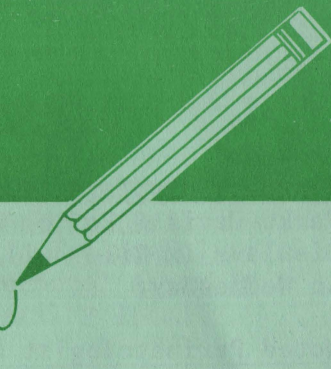

AUTHOR SCHEDULES SESSIONS AT IUPUI

Michael Kammen, author of the acclaimed book, People of Paradox, will lecture at IUPUI on Thursday, March 22.

A senior fellow of National Endowment for the Humanities and professor of history at Cornell University, he will appear at an informal discussion with IUPUI students and faculty at 3:15 p.m. in the Faculty Lounge of Cavanaugh Hall and deliver a full public lecture at 8:15 p.m. in Lecture Hall 102.

Kammen is recognized as a new voice heralding the strength of the American civilization. His public address, "Reflections on the Origins of American Civilization," will deal with this thesis.

He suggests in his recent writings that Americans are products of a series of contradictory patterns in American life, that we at one time are violent and at another time strict advocates of law and order.

His appearance in Indianapolis is part of the Chancellor's Lectures and Convocations Program for the school year.

Kammen is a graduate of George Washington and Harvard universities. At Harvard he won the Bowdoin Prize in 1964 when he earned his Ph.D. He began teaching at Cornell in 1965 and has written or edited 10 books, including his most recent historical commentary which is becoming a best seller. A number of his articles have appeared in leading historical journals.

Noted Perinatologist Coming -- Dr. Frederick C. Battaglia, one of the nation's foremost experts in perinatology, will be the Griffith Visiting Professor in Pediatrics this week at Riley Hospital. Currently professor of pediatrics and director of the Division of Perinatal Medicine at the University of Colorado Medical Center, Dr. Battaglia will participate in two sessions Tuesday: a perinatal conference at 2 p.m. and a research conference on "Aspects of Fetal Nutrition" at 5 p.m. Wednesday's noon Grand Rounds topic will be "Perinatal Medicine--Its Evolution and Its Promise."

LAMKIN ON UNIVERSITY AUTONOMY

Rep. E. Henry Lamkin Jr. (R-Indianapolis) admitted to IUPUI Faculty Club members recently that his University of Indianapolis bill is submitted only to keep the waters stirred up. But he expects full study of university autonomy in Indianapolis to be made soon and serious legislative activity perhaps by the 1974 General Assembly. He told the IUPUI faculty that he favors a completely autonomous university locally, including all units which are here now, under one administration.

Dr. Lamkin also said it is the feeling in the legislature that the Commission for Higher Education be the overseeing authority for all higher education in Indiana. Two things which he favors for the Commission to consider are open enrollment and new ways to provide vocational education.

In answer to a question about autonomy locally, he said Purdue forces are not opposed, Bloomington forces are "not wild about the idea," and the local administration does not seem to be opposed but "they are not in a good position" to show favor or disfavor.

Prospects for more funds for higher education this session of the legislature are dim, he said. "Pressure this year is for penal institutions, which have been neglected in the past."

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HONORS & ACCOLADES DEPT.

Chancellor Maynard K. Hine has been named chairman of the Periodontal Diseases Advisory Committee to the National Institute of Dental Health. The new committee, which includes leaders in biomedical and dental sciences and education, will advise the institute on plans for orderly and profitable pursuit of research on human periodontal disease.

David H. Lovett, sophomore medical student from Zionsville, was presented the ninth annual Barnhill Award at the Department of Anatomy Seminar last month. Lovett won the award for his outstanding academic achievement in anatomy during 1972.

Dr. James C. Shanks, director of speech pathology, has been awarded the Governor's Rehabilitation Award and Distinguished Service Award for outstanding service for employment of the handicapped.

Dr. Eugene E. Levitt, director of the Section of Psychology in the Department of Psychiatry, is chairman of the research committee of the Indiana Mental Health Research Project.
