DAVENPORT TO HEAD IUPUL SAFETY DIVISION

Indianapolis Deputy Chief of Police Spurgeon D. Davenport has been appointed director of the IUPUI Safety Division. Davenport, a veteran with 39 years of service in the city department, will assume command of the 62-member IUPUI division on November 1.

Chancellor Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., said in his announcement of the appointment that "... Chief Davenport is highly qualified for a very sensitive job." Irvin K. Owen, safety director for the I.U. system, said that Davenport emerged as the best applicant after intensive interviews with a series of candidates who had extensive experience in law enforcement at city, state, and Federal levels.

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FINAL COUNT

Final tabulations for the fall semester show Indiana University with 68,869 students on eight campuses, a gain of five-tenths of a per cent (323 students) over 1972.

Registrar M.D. Scherer said the totals were almost exactly as predicted in late summer. He released the following totals for the campuses:
