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Endowed cancer research chair to honor Brand

IU President Michael McRobbie Wednesday announced a campaign to create an endowed faculty chair in cancer research in commemoration of the late Myles Brand, the university's 16th president. The announcement was made at Conseco Fieldhouse during a public tribute for Brand jointly sponsored by IU and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Support for the Brand Chair thus far includes nearly 145 individual gifts and pledges totaling more than \$1.1 million. After Brand's death, his family requested that in lieu of flowers memorial contributions be made to create the Myles Brand Endowed Chair in Cancer Research at the IU School of Medicine. IU is adding a \$1 million match to the endowment.

Brand, who served as IU's 16th president from 1994 to 2002, had been president of the NCAA from January 2003 until his death on Sept. 16 after a nine-month fight against pancreatic cancer. He was 67.

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First director for outreach program named

Fred Hamilton, M.Ed., has been hired as the director of the Diversity Outreach Comprehensive Science Initiative in the Division of Diversity Affairs.

The Division of Diversity Affairs in the Office of Faculty Affairs and Professional Development is newly created and will focus specifically on moving IUSM's diversity agenda forward. Hamilton will be responsibility for enhancing existing elementary, middle, high school and undergraduate pipeline initiatives, as well as creating new programs designed to stimulate and motivate young people to begin thinking about medicine as a career at an early age.

Hamilton received a bachelor's degree in zoology at Ohio University and an master's degree in counseling education from the University of Pittsburgh before attending law school at Southern Illinois University.

A veteran educator and program manager who is no stranger to diversity challenges, he has held numerous positions in science and engineering education as well as administrative positions at secondary and postsecondary levels where programs under his charge netted significant enrollment increases and expansion of education opportunity for underrepresented students.

His former position include director of Upward Bound and special supportive services programs in Ohio and Southern Illinois University; assistant to the vice president for academic affairs and lecturer in humanities and social sciences at Carnegie-Mellon University; assistant to the dean for student affairs at the University of Colorado, Boulder; associate director of the Research Center of Excellence in Cell and Molecular Biology and assistant dean in the School of Graduate Studies and Research at Meharry Medical College. Most recently, he held the position of associate director for multicultural affairs at the medical school at Saint Louis University.

Many of his efforts have been underwritten by co-authored grants received from the Maurice Falk Medical Fund, United States Department of Education, National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation and the National Space and Aeronautics Administration.

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Graduate Medical Education earns institutional accreditation

The Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education has notified the Office of Graduate Medical Education that IUSM as a sponsoring institution has received the maximum accreditation of five years. The next institutional site visit is scheduled for October 2014. Currently IUSM sponsors 76 residency programs with more than 1,000 trainees.

New home for ophthalmology department under construction

Construction began this week on the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute – soon to be the new home of the IUSM Department of Ophthalmology.

Site work begins nearly one year after a ceremonial ground breaking for the four-story, 70,000-square foot building that was made possible by a \$30 million gift from the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Family Foundation. The building is being constructed at the northeast corner of Michigan Street and West Drive and will house the adult outpatient clinic, an optical shop, research space, classrooms, faculty offices, student meeting rooms and room for program expansion.
