



EBERHARDT REPRESENTS THE AMERICAN TURNERS

The Alumni will be interested to know that the Trustees of the Jahn Fund of the American Turners have arranged ' to sponsor an annual lecture on Health, Physical Education and Recreation to be given at Indiana University. The series of lectures was opened by our own alumnus, Walter Eberhardt, Director of Physical Education of St. Louis University, who gave the first talk on the Influence of the Turners on American Democratic Society. BRADFORD WOODS

Indiana University has again been honored. The American Camping Association has accepted the generous offer of the University to establish its national headquarters at Bradford Woods. This area, a few miles north of Martinsville, has been established as an outdoor education center operated by the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. It is a wooded area of about 2300 acres, devoted entirely to camping and other related activities.

Several other sites were considered, but because of the excellent location and the unusual opportunities offered, the Camping Association decided in favor of the I.U. offer. Reynold Carlson, Associate Professor in the Recreation Department was instrumental in the development of the area and through his efforts the Camping Association will come to Indiana.

The Indiana Section of the American Camping Association also makes good use of Bradford Woods. Their spring leader—ship training institute was held there the week-end of May 13-15. Most of the staff of Camp Brosius Children's Camp was there. Many types of camp craft were shown. Those attending experienced a variety of activities from whittling to building a lean-to. It was a most enjoyable and profitable week-end.
