

FELTEN WINS MacARTHUR PRIZE

Dr. David Felten, professor of anatomy and of neurobiology at the I.U. School of Medicine, is among 20 Americans who are recipients of this year's MacArthur Prize Fellowships, according to an announcement made last week by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation.

The awards are unique in funding exceptionally talented individuals personally -- rather than projects -- over five years with no strings attached. Originated in 1981, they range from \$24,000 to \$60,000 annually. Purpose of the fellowships is to free the individuals from economic pressures so they can devote themselves fully to their own research and creative pursuits.

The 20 new recipients, who collectively represent some 28 areas of interest, bring the total number of Prize Fellows to 80. More than 50 fields now are represented in the program. Individuals cannot apply for the awards. The program relies for candidates on 100 anonymous "nominators" or "talent scouts" around the country. The nominators, who come from many walks of life and endeavors, submit the names of candidates along with the reasons for their choices. All the nominees, after investigation, are considered by a 13-member selection committee which deliberates every month. The Foundation directors approved the 20 selections Jan. 13.

Dr. Felten, who came to the medical school in 1974, is a native of Sheboygan, Wis. He earned a bachelor's degree at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a medical degree and Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania. According to the Foundation, he will receive \$34,400 this year, and the award will be increased \$800 each year during the next five years for a total prize of \$179,900.

The MacArthur Prize Fellows program has none of the restrictions and requirements of other comparable programs, including the requirements of submitting applications, drawing up appealing projects, making reports, publishing and shaping projects to fit particular funding patterns, said J. Roderick MacArthur, chairman of the MacArthur Prize Fellows Program and son of the creator of the Foundation. "The qualities sought in the individuals in the selection process for the Prize Fellows are exceptional talent, originality, self-direction and promise for the future," he continued.

Dr. Felten said the prize will enable him to begin research he believed would have to wait for several years. "I've been accelerating my research ever since I came to Indianapolis," he said. "But with the award, I hope to pursue areas which I would have had to postpone for years or even decades.

Felten's major research has included investigation into the central nervous system's role in psychiatric and physiological illness. "I hope to continue research in those areas," he said, "but an area I hope to pursue considerably more is study of how the nervous system regulates the body's immune response."

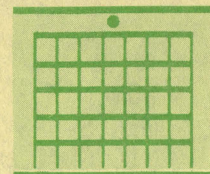
