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## BONE MARROW TRANSPLANT HELPS YOUNG BRIDE

was released last week from our bone marrow transplant center at the Medical Center following four weeks of successful recovery from the transplantation process to treat acute myelocytic leukemia (AML). She will stay in the Ronald McDonald House on campus for two or three weeks where her progress can be assessed frequently by her physicians. Her primary physician is Dr. Jan Jansen (pronounced "Yon Yonsen"), associate professor of medicine and pediatrics and director of the bone marrow transplant center—the first in the state that was established last January. Lisa was diagnosed as having AML last May, received standard treatment, after which the disease went into remission. She was admitted to the transplantation unit at Riley Hospital on Jan. 16, soon after her wedding. She began the transplant process on Jan. 25 using bone marrow from her 17-year-old sister, a matched donor. Dr. Jansen said, "Mrs. Filips still has a ways to go. Though we are very optimistic, we will not be able to say that she is cured of her leukemia until it has been in complete remission for one year."—PP

## DENTISTS PRACTICE 'OUTDOOR' DENTISTRY IN KENYA

Dr. Charles E. Hutton, professor and chairman of the Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the School of Dentistry, and other dentists recently returned from a month in Kenya, East Africa, where they carried instruments and medication to patients in primitive villages in a 1,500-mile trek. The team was part of a larger group arranged through DePauw University to assist the Institute of Cultural Affairs in its African missions. Working outdoors to take advantage of the sun for lighting, dentists in the team saw as many as 350 patients a day. The last two days were spent treating patients in the Nairobi ghetto where 80,000 people live in two square miles. Kenya has approximately 20 million people and fewer than 300 dentists. The first venture of its kind, the success it brought will help further missions and possibly set the stage for an East African Dental Congress to be held in 1986 as a cooperative effort between IU and the Kenyan Dental Association.

## SLIGHTLY FEWER STUDENTS ENROLL FOR SPRING

While it could be that they knew what a rotten winter this would be, it is more likely that the reason that 167 fewer students enrolled this semester than a year ago is that the economy is better and more are working and that we are a victim of statistics that show there are fewer college-age students. Officially, we enrolled 22,432 students for second semester compared to 22,599. That is only a drop for IUPUI of .7 per cent. Systemwide, the total decline was 1.3 percent. IU now has 75,270 students. We also showed a drop in credit hours. The 2 per cent drop now has faculty teaching 206,471 hours compared to 210,704. Following are enrollment figures for all campuses:
