DR. MALONEY TO OVERSEE GRADUATE NURSING PROGRAMS

Dr. Margaret Moloney has been recently appointed professor and assistant dean of graduate programs at the I.U. School of Nursing. New directions in graduate nursing education at I.U. have necessitated the appointment of an administrator with considerable expertise to further develop and co-ordinate the various graduate program offerings within the school.

Dr. Moloney's background in graduate education will help the school accomplish this goal. She has served as assistant dean and chairman of the graduate nursing programs within the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Boston College and dean and professor of the School of Nursing at Loyola University of Chicago.

As assistant dean at I.U., Dr. Moloney's responsibilities will include the direction, supervision and leadership of the master's degree program in nursing. She also is responsible for the specialist degree program in clinical nursing and for the newly proposed doctoral program, leading to a doctorate of nursing science degree, which is still in the early planning stages. She will be involved in improving communications between all nursing programs at I.U.

Dr. Moloney has traveled extensively throughout the Middle East to study health facilities there with a grant awarded by the World Health Organization. She visited more than 150 health agencies and has published several papers dealing with her findings.

She has also served as chairman of the Council of Deans and Directors of Baccalaureate and Higher Degree Programs in Illinois. She is a member of the national nursing honorary society, Sigma Theta Tau, and became the first woman member of the National Jesuit Honorary Society, Alpha Sigma Nu, in 1973. A member of the Sisters of Mercy, Chicago Province, she also continues to serve as a member of the board of directors of Mercy Hospital Medical Center in Chicago.

UROLOGY SEMINAR DRAWS CROWD

A record-breaking number of physicians from throughout the United States and Canada will be attending a postgraduate seminar sponsored by the North Central Section of the American Urological Association and the I.U. School of Medicine Friday through Sunday. Dr. John P. Donohue, chairman of the School of Medicine's Department of Urology, is course director.

Originally scheduled for the Indianapolis Hilton, the meetings were moved to the Convention-Exposition Center when it became obvious that there would be more than 600 urologists registered. Stature of the local faculty is evidenced by the fact that the national association traditionally has held two meetings such as this each year, one in San Diego and one in Toronto. The course in Indianapolis was added some time after these other two meetings were scheduled, yet the Indianapolis course is by far the largest.
