Riley Hospital for Children places high in national ranks

Riley Hospital for Children has been ranked in eight out of 10 categories in the 2010-11 edition of Best Children's Hospitals, published online and featured in the August issue of U.S. News & World Report, available on newsstands starting Tuesday, July 27.

The 2010-11 *Best Children's Hospitals* ranks hospitals in cancer, diabetes and endocrinology, gastroenterology, heart and heart surgery, kidney, neonatology, neurology and neurosurgery, orthopedics, pulmonology and urology.

Riley Hospital's specialty programs recognized by the report, and their numerical rankings, are:

- Urology 3rd
- Pulmonology 14th
- Diabetes & Endocrinology 15th
- Neonatology 20th
- Gastroenterology 22nd
- Heart & Heart Surgery 29th
- Neurology & Neurosurgery 29th
- Cancer 30th

This year's rankings were based on reputation, medical outcomes and care-related indicators of quality, such as the number of patients, nurse staffing and availability of specialized programs. A total of 170 pediatric centers were asked to complete a 75-page survey. Of the 170 hospitals contacted, 96 provided information.

Scientific writing workshop

George D. Gopen, PhD, professor of the practice of rhetoric, Duke University, will offer a two-day workshop, "Scientific Writing from the Reader's Perspective," Monday, June 21, to Tuesday, June 22, in the Walther Hall (R3) auditorium.

As competition for external funding becomes more challenging, the importance of getting one's scholarly work successfully published is more important than ever. Dr. Gopen's approach is based on a single idea: Learning to write for the reader allows the writer to control what readers learn.

Dr. Gopen has presented this workshop at IUSM for the past three years, and has changed participants' writing habits permanently, often resulting in improved grant writing success. Both junior investigators and experienced scholars/mentors will benefit from this program.

Registrants must be able to commit two full days (6/21-6/22) to this workshop, as each session builds upon the previous one.

This weekend, Saturday, June 19, and Sunday, June 20, *Sound Medicine* host Barbara Lewis and guests will discuss in-home care, health implications of caregivers and depression.

Sound Medicine reporter Sandy Roob will explain why private home care is the fastest growing area of geriatric care because it provides an alternative to nursing homes.

Steven Albert, PhD, professor of behavioral and community health sciences at the University of Pittsburgh, will discuss his recent study conducted for MetLife Insurance Company that found caregivers have poorer health and cost their employers more money than their counterparts.

Jesse Stewart, PhD, assistant professor of psychology at IUPUI, will explain his findings that depression may cause inflammation linked to heart disease, but the reverse is probably not true as previously thought.

Chuck Dietzen, MD, founder of The Timmy Foundation, an organization that has helped channel funds, volunteers and medical professionals to poor areas at home and abroad, will discuss his recent medical mission trip to Haiti.

This week's *Sound Medicine* "Checkup" will explore happiness and middle age with Arthur Stone, PhD, a distinguished professor of psychiatry and behavioral science at Stony Brook School of Medicine.

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) has awarded \$750,000 in Collaboration in Translational Research (CTR) grants to investigators involved in translational research projects at IUSM, IUPUI, IU-Bloomington, Purdue University and the University of Notre Dame.

These grants will foster collaboration between researchers across the Indiana CTSI's member institutions by providing initial support for projects with the potential to develop into larger, continuing, externally funded research programs. BioCrossroads seeks nominations for the individual who has made the most positive impact on the growth of the state's life sciences sector to honor at the Indiana Life Sciences Summit Oct. 27.

The August Watanabe Life Sciences Champion of the Year award recognizes an entrepreneurial, research, corporate, medical, academic or philanthropic individual who has made particularly significant achievements in the development and promotion of Indiana's life sciences sector.

Last year, Richard DiMarchi, PhD, the Linda & Jack Gill Professor in Biomolecular Sciences and professor of chemistry at Indiana University and chief scientific officer of Marcadia Biotech, was recognized for his work bridging industry with academia, and bringing national attention to the life sciences efforts in Indiana.

Criteria for the award include:

- Must be a resident of Indiana
- Must be an individual supporting Indiana's life sciences growth via entrepreneurial, research, corporate, medical, academic or philanthropic work
- Judging will be based on assessments of cumulative contribution, not specific achievements over the course of a year.

In honor of the award recipient, BioCrossroads will give grants to two teachers in the science, technology, engineering or mathematics disciplines to pursue professional development through the

Indiana Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (I-STEM) Resource Network. The I-STEM Resource Network will select the teaching recipients.

Scope wants your news items.

The deadline for submission is 8:30 a.m. on Thursdays. *Scope* is published electronically and sent to faculty, staff, students, and residents on Fridays (except on holiday weekends when it is published on the following Monday).

There are three easy ways to submit story ideas or information to Scope:
