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### LEGISLATIVE REPORTS VI

## New Bills - House

- HB 1541 (Lamkin) -- Would provide immunity and confidentiality to peer review committees formed by professional societies or hospital staffs to evaluate physicians, dentists, psychologists, pharmacists, and others. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- HB 1588 (Jones) -- Would provide for repayable grants to medical and other health profession students preparing to become employees of the state Department of Correction or Department of Mental Health; provides for forgiveness of grants under certain conditions. Assigned to Human Affairs committee.
- HB 1616 (Jones) -- Would establish voter residency in the county in which a student attends an institution of higher education. Assigned to Elections committee.
- HB 1621 (Gaylord) -- Would allow student bodies at state universities to elect a student to board of trustees. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1759 (Fruechtenicht, Schulz) -- Would allow students who will be granted Indiana University degrees at next annual commencement to vote with the alumni in electing alumni trustees. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1795 (Schultz, Ferguson) -- Would provide that the state shall pay county and local governments a service charge for governmental services provided by state universities. Assigned to Way & Means committee.
- HB 1809 (F.B. Coleman) -- Would permit acupuncture by unlicensed persons in an approved medical school for primary purpose of scientific investigation. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- HB 1822 (Anderson, Jones) -- Would provide for establishment of a state university at Fort Wayne. Assigned to Education committee.

# Legislative Action -- House

- HB 1016 Would permit any competent person to receive by his own consent medical or hospital care, treatment, or information about venereal disease, drug or alcohol abuse or addiction, pregnancy or childbirth, mental illness, or contraception. Passed 79-12 and sent to Senate.
- HB 1093 Would provide for the reorganization of Indiana State University at Evansville as autonomous University of Southern Indiana. Passed 89-3 and sent to Senate.
- HB 1109 Would permit college and university guards to participate in law enforcement training programs on a voluntary basis. Passed 87-0 and sent to Senate.
- HB 1134 Would permit persons 18 and older to be parties in civil suits and to appear before courts without guardians. Passed 88-6 and sent to Senate.
- HB 1169 Would require physicians and laboratories to report cancers and malignancies to the State Board of Health. Passed 81-11 and sent to Senate.
- 1195 Would lower to 18 the minimum age requirements for licenses to accountants, health administrators, nurses, pharmacists, physical therapists, psychologists, and others. Amended, passed 81-10, and sent to Senate.

- HB 1243 Would lower to 18 the minimum age of consent for medical examination and treatment; would eliminate any age requirement for consent to medical treatment by married persons and for consent to treatment of venereal disease. Passed 82-7 and sent to Senate.
- HB 1277 Would prohibit denial or revocation of professional or occupational license because of conviction of misdemeanor or felony. Passed 55-35 and sent to Senate.
- HB 1337 Would provide for representation of IHETS board for private colleges and universities. Passed 94-0 and sent to Senate.


SB 129 - Would require payment of overtime to state employees. Passed 38-9 and sent to House.

## BE SAFE -- START NOW

The year-end report, released last week by IUPUI Safety Director Ronald F. Bryant, contains several cautions for university faculty, staff and students.

Bryant cautioned IUPUI people to exercise more care in the safe-keeping of their property. In many cases of theft last year, the inconvenience of the loss of personal property could have been avoided by simply taking the key out of one's locker, locking a room, car or locker, putting a wallet in one's pocket or putting a purse in a safe place.



University police officers have been instructed to stop and question anyone carrying any property from a university building. Department heads should give an employee a written letter of authorization to remove any article from the premises. Any person not having such a letter could be inconvenienced while their story is being checked.

Bryant reported that more than \$80,000-worth of property was reported stolen last year. Of that amount, nearly \$34,000 was recovered. "Some university employees were implicated in the disappearances," he said. "One of them is serving a one-to-five-year prison sentence for his part in the theft of laundry from one of the hospitals." He also noted that his detectives successfully concluded a case of aggravated assault upon a student by a former student on university property, sending the felon to prison for one to five years.

Bryant attributed much of the success of his officers to increased training. "I.U. police officers have undergone, collectively, 8,024 hours of specialized training in order to better themselves and their department's professional capabilities," he said.
