ast August we told you about four task forces that were at work preparing data to help us see where we've been, where we are and where we need to go. Gerald R. Bepko, dean of the School of Law, was chairman of the Community Subcommittee and he wants to share some results with you. From the 202 questionnaires returned by leaders in business, labor, the professions, industry, neighborhood associations, civic and social organizations, people report they are pleased with us as a university and with our place in the community. They checked off answers like "professional," "essential," "clean," "convenient," and "practical." They think we are good, but can get better—but can't say exactly in what areas we need improving. More than half of those responding to the questions said they'd send their sons and daughters here, and that teaching, more than research or community service, is our most important mission and the thing they think we do best. Community leaders apparently want us to have better working relationships with business and industry, but that overall our progress in the past 15 years has been "outstanding" and "better than average."

#### TAKE CARE OF THOSE TELEPHONE CREDIT CARDS

John Williams, Telecommunication Services, wants to remind us that "faculty and staff members who have an IUPUI, AT&T Calling Card are responsible for the safety and security of the card." He explains: All calls made on the card will be the responsibility of the department listed when the card was issued. If the card is lost or the number has been "compromised," the Telecommunications Services Business Office must be notified in writing immediately so that card can be revoked. Until the notice is received, the department will be responsible for all calls made on the card—no exceptions. Cases of credit card abuse will be turned over to the telephone company toll investigation unit, but departments are apprised that cases of complete recovery of wholesale misuse of credit cards in cases where they have been stolen are rare....

George K. Francis, professor of math, University of Illinois, is the keynote speaker for the annual Ernest R. He will speak on "Shadows from the Fourth Dimension" at 11 a.m. (students welcome) and again at 4 p.m. on "Mathematical Graphics in Transition: Freehand and Computer." projections of four-dimensional objects: The hypercube, the Veronese surface and others. 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HEAR YE: HEAR YE: Operations to implant two new multi-channel cochlear implant devices were performed two weeks ago by physicians at our medical center. A cochlear implant device is an electrical stimulator that, when implanted, enables profoundly deaf persons to hear sounds. The new multi-channel cochlear implant device has been shown to enhance a deaf person's abilty to hear not only sound, but to understand speech.... Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto, associate professor of otolaryngology and the Arilla DeVault Distinguished Investigator, is director of the program, which is now one of the world's most complete programs of cochlear implant devices. The two patients receiving the implants are now receiving training and follow-up care and some time early next year a progress report will be made.-PP

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
