**REGISTRATION PREDICTIONS** 

A 15 per cent increase in new students, including freshmen and transfers, is expected when IUPUI begins classes Wednesday.

Registration for more than 17,000 students expected was held Friday and this Monday (August 21) at the Lecture Center on the new Downtown Campus.

John C. Krivacs, IUPUI director of admissions, reported that enrollment of new students will be up significantly in several fields. The Herron School of Art will have about 37 per cent more students than last year; the two-year nursing program will have a 36 per cent increase; business is up 18 per cent, and engineering is up 5 per cent---which he said is remarkable with engineering registrations down generally in the nation.

He noted also that there will be 443 veterans among the new students this fall, and 6 per cent more women than last year. While admissions of Hoosier residents is down 2 per cent, non-resident admissions are up 29 per cent. Non-residents pay twice the tuition and fees of that charged to residents.

The new freshman class will number 3,500. Also, more than 400 non-degree students will be among the new students at IUPUI.

## ATT: WOMEN

Women who are considering entering or re-entering the employment market will get some advice on how to find what jobs are available and what they can do to get them in a one-day seminar September 14 at the 38th Street Campus of IUPUI.

The seminar entitled, Women and the World of Work, or "How to Get A Job and Like It," will offer job-hunting women the chance to explore the present-day job market and to look at some of the personal and family adjustments they may face if they find employment.

The program, sponsored by Indianapolis businesses and the IUPUI Continuing Education Office, will be offered for an enrollment fee of \$5.

The 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. seminar will begin with coffee and registration followed by a slide presentation depicting a woman job-hunting at several local businesses and industries.

"How to Put Your Best Foot Forward," will be discussed by speech professor Dr. B. Bruce Wagener, in a session covering the job interview, resume and application.

Jane Pettijohn of Key Placement Service will discuss use of public and private employment services.

"Who Am I? What Can I Do?" will be explored with Dr. Eugene E. Levitt, director of the Section of Psychology and professor of clinical psychology, in a session designed to help women determine their own attitudes and adaptabilities as well as their capabilities as employees.

After lunch, Miss Mary Manning, director of the Women's Bureau, U.S. Department of Labor, Chicago, will give a keynote address about the changing labor market and its effect on women.

Dr. Diane L. Brashear, professor in the Graduate School of Social Service, will conduct a session on family expectations and adjustments followed by a panel of women who have gone back to work under varying circumstances who will give hints on how working women can manage the household, plan ahead, and adjust to new expenses.

"Preparing for a Better Job" will be the subject of a talk by Philip Martin, director of employee relations at Methodist Hospital, who will provide information on education programs, types of training available, how to choose the programs and check school qualifications.

An evaluation session by enrollees will conclude the seminar.

All blue and gree parking decals expire on September 1. After September 1, all current decals are invalid. New decals must be obtained from the Safety Department and in place on windshields by September 1 for those who wish to continue parking in blue and green lots.

The annual expiration of parking decals was provided for in the IUPUI Parking Regulations which were promulgated last year -- and the current parking decals do carry an expiration date. However, the expiration was not widely announced.

To renew stickers, applicants must fill in registration cards which are available from the Safety Department. Applicants must also pay up all unpaid parking fines before the stickers will be renewed. Department chairmen and office heads are urged to secure registration cards from the Safety Department, distribute them among present permit holders, and remind the permit holders that their present decals expire on September 1.

And from Vice-Chancellor Jack M. Ryder come these parking notes:

- 1. Effective date of new regulations -- September 1, 1972.
- 2. All faculty, staff and students who have not paid their past-due fines for parking violations should not expect to be issued a 1972-73 sticker until payment is made.
- 3. Fines will be levied at the rate of \$3 for each parking violation.
- 4. There is a new blacktop surface, guarded, free parking lot owned and operated by General Hospital west of the hospital and north of the physical plant building. This lot is free to all IUPUI faculty, staff and students.
