MEDICAL CENTER SNUFFS SMOKING JULY 1

You may have read it before, but it bears repeating that effective July 1 smoking will be prohibited in all IU Medical Center buildings and hospitals. The new policy prohibits smoking not only in buildings, but on the premises of Medical Center buildings. (The policy does not include Larue Carter Memorial Hospital or Wishard Hospital because they are not housed in University buildings. The VA Hospital has already instituted a no-smoking policy.) Also, Hospital Human Resources Development will continue to offer stop smoking classes to faculty, staff and students. The decision to protect the health of patients, guests, visitors and staff with a smoke-free environment was reached after careful deliberation that included extensive discussion and approval by the hospitals' administrative staff and the executive committee of the medical staff. "It is supportive of and consistant with a strong movement in the national medical community," said David Handel, director of Hospitals, about the new policy. The movement focuses on the inherent inconsistency between known health hazards of smoking and the acceptance of smoking within a medical institution, the administration further said. The Medical Center joins several Indianapolis-area hospitals in implementing a smoke-free environment this year.

STATE'S FIRST LADY, COREY LECTURES OPEN PLAYWRITING COMPETITION

Indiana's first lady Susan Bayh and publisher Orlin Corey will launch the fourth biennial National Playwriting Competition for Young Audiences, sponsored by IUPUI University Theatre. A strong advocate for literacy for all, Mrs. Bayh said she fully endorses the competition to encourage writers to create artistic scripts for young people. The opening is May 3 at the Indianapolis Museum of Art, where Mrs. Bayh and Corey will hold a news conference to announce the competition. The same day, Corey, who is owner/publisher of Anchorage Press, the nation's largest publisher of plays for youth, will give two free public lectures that will be followed by receptions. He presents "Theatre and Arts Education" at 2 p.m. in DeBoest Lecture Hall, IMA, and at 7 p.m. he presents "Theatre and Young Audiences in America Today" in the University Theatre, Mary Cable Building. Corey is on tour with his latest book, "An Odyssey of Masquers: The Everyman Players," a true account of the touring repertory company he has directed for 24 consecutive seasons. In the competition, 10 finalists will be selected and four cash awards of \$1,000 each will go to writers of the top four plays. Winning plays will have polished readings by professionals during a playwriting symposium on campus next March, which winners must be able to attend. Guidelines and entry forms are available in University Theatre, 4-2095. Deadline for submitting is Oct. 1. Dorothy Webb, director of youth theater at IUPUI, is handling this fourth national contest, which she started in 1984.

PARALLEL COMPUTERS SEMINAR ATTRACTS INTERNATIONAL SCIENTISTS TO CAMPUS

Engineers and computer scientists from Europe, Canada, South Africa and the U.S. are expected to attend a conference on high performance "parallel computers" May 6-8 at University Place. Much of the attraction is the expertise and reputation of Akin Ecer, professor of mechanical engineering and director of the computational fluid dynamics lab, Div. of Engineering. Recognized as an authority in the use of parallel computers, he said, "When you hear about powerful computers solving problems, this (parallel computers) is where it is."
