NEW FACULTY BRING DIVERSE AREAS OF EXPERTISE TO IUPUI

Dean P. Nicholas Kellum is pleased to announce that three new members have joined the faculty of the School of Physical Education. Dr. Rafael Bahamonde, Dr. Louise Goggans and Dr. Katie Stanton all were appointed assistant professors of physical education.

Bahamonde came to the school in August 1996. He teaches kinesiology, exercise science, and tests and measurements.

Bahamonde is a native of Puerto Rico, and first came to Indiana in 1976 on a basketball scholarship to DePauw University.

He received a bachelor of arts from DePauw with a double major in physical education and Spanish. He then completed a master's in physical education at Indiana State University. From 1983 to 1988, he was a graduate assistant at Indiana University-Bloomington, while he earned a doctorate in human performance with a minor in anatomy.

Bahamonde was a member of the Ball State faculty from 1988 to 1996. He has to his credit an impressive list of publications, abstracts and presentations in a wide range of subjects related to biomechanics. He also has received external funding for a number of research projects, including a recent grant from the U.S. Tennis Association.

Goggans joined the faculty in September 1995. She came to the School of Physical Education by way of the Regenstrief Health Center at Wishard Memorial Hospital, where she had been director of nutrition services since 1973. Goggans teaches the basic undergraduate nutrition class required of all majors and a course

in the health education curriculum, Marriage and Family Interaction.

Goggans earned a bachelor of arts in foods and nutrition from Indiana University-Bloomington, and a master of science in nutrition education and a doctorate of medical science degree from the IU School of Medicine in Indianapolis. She has spent the greatest part of her professional career in a clinical setting, although she taught for two

Goggans is a member of both the American and Indiana Dietetic Associations, the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapists and the American Diabetic Association, which she serves as president of the Indiana affiliate.

Stanton came to IUPUI from a two-year interim appointment at Ball State. She joined the School of Physical Education faculty in August 1996 and teaches adapted physical education and motor learning. A California native, Stanton earned a bachelor of science in human development and exercise physiology from the University of California-Davis; a master's degree in adapted physical education at the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse; and a doctorate in adapted physical education from the University of Virginia.

Stanton is a sought-after clinician who is regarded as one of the country's emerging adapted physical education authorities. She

DEAN'S MESSAGE: POSITIVE CHANGES

Change, retrenchment, restructuring, downsizing, outsourcing are but a few of the "buzzwords" describing the current state of higher education in this country. Because higher education is experiencing higher tuition, decreased research funding, decreased state appropriations and in some cases declining enrollments, change has been inevitable.

Change can be a good thing, however. In the case of the School of Physical Education and its role within Indiana University and the campus of IUPUI, recent changes in academic programs have been received favorably by our faculty and students. I would like to share some of these changes with our alumni.

Since our establishment as an independent school within the IU system in 1972, there have on occasion been discussions about the prospects of re-merging with the School of HPER in Bloomington or with another unit on the IUPUI campus. Those discussions have never excited our faculty and students, and certainly not our alumni. Most of us would cite continued growth of the school in both size and stature as an argument to maintain the status quo.

Two years ago we found ourselves on the other side of the merger or reorganization table, when the IUPUI campus leadership asked us to assume administrative responsibilities for two additional departments:

Military Science, and
Restaurant, Hotel,
Institutional and
Tourism Management
(RHIT).

The Military Science
Department consists of a

staff of six military instructors and enrollment of about 100 students. These students earn degrees in one of the 100-plus undergraduate programs, as well as complete requirements established by the U.S. Army. Our goal is to annually commission 16 second lieutenants who go on to advanced military training.

The other new department—Restaurant, Hotel, Institutional and Tourism Management—was housed in the Purdue University School of Engineering and Technology, where they offer the associate degree in food service and lodging supervision, and the bachelor's degree in hospitality management. The department currently has 150 majors and a faculty of three.

Many people ask about the connection between a Department of Physical Education and a Department of Restaurant, Hotel, Institutional and Tourism Management. The most common denominator is probably the respective interest in nutrition. Both departments continue to offer very popular courses in nutrition. A more global view is that leisure studies at many colleges and universities is a component of recreation departments, which are allied to physical education. We have tried not to dwell too much on "why," so we can concentrate on "how" to promote this new program. We have had remarkable success so far, increasing enrollments by nearly 40 percent.

The spirit of cooperation among the new faculties and student bodies has been remarkable. Perhaps the most compelling example of cooperation centers around Camp Brosius. The RHIT curriculum requires a class in quantity food preparation, in which students learn to cook for groups of 50 or more. Because the campus does not have a commercial food lab, the department had to teach the course at some off-campus location. When the faculty learned

about Camp Brosius, they asked if it would be possible to experiment by teaching the quantity food class there. What started as a modest experiment in 1995 now amounts to a literal waiting list of RHIT students to attend camp.

This past summer, 26 RHIT students divided into two teams provided all of the food service during the college camping session. The quality of the food and service were so outstanding that it was not unusual for the physical education students to offer standing ovations at the conclusion of meals.

We hope to make some rather meaningful curriculum changes in the next two years. One would establish tourism as an undergraduate major on our campus. Statistics show that tourism is the country's leading industry, and Indianapolis is a leading tourism center. We will certainly keep you informed of our progress.
