# Egan joins IU School of Medicine to lead Precision Health Initiative

Carmel Egan, PhD, a top project management and product development executive at Eli Lilly and Company, has joined Indiana University School of Medicine as project leader of IU's Precision Health Initiative.

Dr. Egan, vice president, medicines development unit at Lilly, has held a series of leadership positions at the pharmaceutical company. Prior to her current position, she served as vice president of special Alzheimer's disease initiatives in Lilly's Biomedicines Business Unit.

She will coordinate activities of the Precision Health Initiative as part of her role as associate dean for research affairs at the school. Dr. Egan has also been named chief operating officer of the Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute.

The Precision Health Initiative, funded in part by the IU Grand Challenges program, is a \$120 million multicampus effort to incorporate the genetic, developmental, behavioral and environmental factors that contribute to an individual's health and develop highly targeted therapies that will improve the well-being of both individuals and the community.

Dr. Egan, who received her PhD in chemistry from University College Dublin in Ireland, joined Eli Lilly and Company in 1986.

# Wurtz appointed orthopaedic surgery chair

L. Daniel Wurtz, MD, was appointed chair of the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery, having served as interim chair since July 2015.

Dr. Wurtz, whose practice specialty is orthopedic surgical oncology, joined the Indiana University School of Medicine faculty in 1997. In addition to treating adult and pediatric patients at IU School of Medicine's partner hospitals and clinics, Dr. Wurtz has served as the orthopaedic service line leader, chief of musculoskeletal surgical oncology, director of the Bone Cancer Research Fund at the IU Foundation, and orthopaedic surgery residency program director.

He is an affiliate member of IU Simon Cancer Center and is co-director of the sarcoma service at IU Simon Cancer Center. Dr. Wurtz is a member of numerous professional organizations and has been honored many times for his work as an educator for learners at all levels at IU School of Medicine. BACK TO TOP ▲

# Statewide student forums help evaluate curriculum

With the aim of driving relevant and student-centered changes to medical education, Indiana University School of Medicine is seeking student input to support improvements and enhancements. Maureen Harrington, PhD, associate dean, medical student education in foundational sciences, has been traveling to the school's statewide campuses, soliciting feedback on the Phase I and Legacy curricula from MS1 and MS2 students.

"In these sessions, students have an opportunity to voice their concerns and bring suggestions for improvements. It is incredibly important that students attend a forum, so that I can understand their concerns and with their help develop strategies to address them where possible," says Dr. Harrington.

These open forums have received tremendous responses from students on the six campuses Dr. Harrington has visited so far. The forums are also avenues to provide direction on the new curriculum and give context to decisions regarding changes, as they are made.

"In the implementation of a new curriculum, there's faculty-perspective and student-perspective. My goal is to create a shared vision. Therefore, it is important to have these conversations to find out what's happening statewide," Dr. Harrington added.

Topics brought forth in the feedback forums will be reviewed and acted upon, to make the curriculum relevant, following best practices in medical education. Dr. Harrington will visit West Lafayette, Bloomington and Muncie in November. MS1 and MS2 students from these campuses are encouraged to participate in their respective campus forum. # IU Center for Diabetes and Metabolic Diseases to fund three projects

A primary research-related activity of the IU Center for Diabetes and Metabolic Diseases (CDMD) Pilot and Feasibility (P&F) program is to foster the development of new diabetes-related investigators and provide seed-support for innovative, high-risk projects. The CDMD P&F program can fund up to three meritorious proposals at up to \$45,000 each.

Investigators at Indiana University, IUPUI and Purdue University are eligible. The program is particularly directed at new investigators and established investigators new to diabetes-related research. Proposals will also be considered from established diabetes investigators pursuing high-impact/high-risk projects or projects that are a significant departure from their usual work.

## Still need your flu shot?

Free flu shots are available through IUPUI Campus Health for all faculty, staff and students. Faculty and staff can get flu shots at Campus Health in Coleman Hall or one of the many Flu Shot Outreach Clinics organized by Campus Health. Students can get flu shots at Campus Health, a Flu Shot Outreach Clinic or Campus Center Student Health.

All faculty, staff and students will need to show a Jagtag. Students will also be asked to show an insurance card, though they can get a free flu shot regardless of whether they have an insurance card.

For specific information regarding clinic times and outreach clinics, faculty and staff should check the Campus Health website. Students should check the Student Health website for information on Student Health hours and the outreach clinics.

The deadline for clinical faculty, house staff and students who see patients or work in a hospital with a mandatory flu vaccine policy is Thursday, Nov. 10. House staff and students are advised to get a flu shot from Campus Health, which will automatically track compliance with the deadline.
