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SPORTS CENTER WINS AWARD

The Indianapolis Sports Center, home of the U.S. Clay Court tennis championships, has been given the United States Tennis Association Facilities Award for 1981. The award was transmitted to Mayor William H. Hudnut by Robert Baxter, special assistant to the I.U. vice president, Indianapolis, who is president of Municipal Recreation, Inc., which runs the Sports Center.

Baxter said that the primary purpose of the award is to promote high standards of construction and renovation of public tennis facilities. Each facility examined by USTA is categorized by seating capacity and number of tennis courts. The facilities are judged for their overall master plan, site adaptation, layout of the tennis courts, maintenance operations and aesthetics.

"One of the largest and best equipped complexes in the country," the Sports Center contains 18 clay courts and six hard surface courts. The main court has permanent seating for 8,000 spectators, and is expanded to 10,000 during the Clay Courts tournament. The complex stands on a corner of the campus near the I.U. School of Law-Indianapolis.

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OPEN HOUSE PLANNED

An open house for medical professionals will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. Friday in level two of the new 19-bed cardiac intensive care unit being completed at a cost of \$2.1 million in unfinished space of the fifth floor of University Hospital.

The acute coronary care section (level one) and the progressive care section (level two) of the new unit will be side by side when level two is ready for patients late this month. Patients already are being cared for in level one, which was completed in June. Professional staff of the cardiac intensive care



unit will be at the open house to answer questions, and escorted tours will be available on level one.

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BEERING BECOMES AAMC CHAIRMAN-ELECT

Dr. Steven C. Beering, dean of the I.U. School of Medicine, has been named chairman-elect of the Assembly of the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) and will become chairman of the Association at the annual meeting in November 1982. (The AAMC met last week in Washington, D.C., its headquarters.)

The Association was formed in 1876 and represents all of the 126 United States medical schools, more than 400 teaching hospitals, over 60 medical professorial societies, and the U.S. medical students. During the past year Dean Beering has been chairman of the Council of Deans of the AAMC.

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MILITARY PARK DECISION DELAYED

The White River Park Development Commission has postponed a design issue decision involving the relocation of a portion of Central Canal through Military Park -- a historic 14-acre area between the School of Law and West Street bounded on the north by New York Street and on the south by the canal. It is to be included as a part of the White River Park.

The 10-member Commission will consider the issue this month. The decision may have to be approved by the State Review Board for Historical Preservation. Opposition to the proposed plan by Reid Williamson, Indiana Historic Landmarks Foundation, and other local preservationists, resulted in the matter being tabled by the Review Board during its Sept. 23 meeting.
