ALUMNUS TO HEAD CARDIOLOGY AT VETERAN'S HOSPITAL

A noted alumnus of the IU School of Medicine is returning to play a key role in cardiology research and services. Dr. John F. Williams Sr., immediate past president of the American College of Cardiology, has joined the staff of the medical school as a professor of medicine and will be chief of the cardiology section of the V.A. Medical Center. He also will be a senior research investigator at the Krannert Institute of Cardiology. Dr. Williams is a 1956 graduate of the medical school and has completed fellowships in cardiology at the med center and the National Institutes of Health. In 1965 he served here as an assistant professor, then as associate professor of medicine and chief of cardiovascular research at V.A. Before his return to campus, he was at the University of Texas. Dr. Williams is the fifth current IU faculty member to have served as president of the American College of Cardiology. The other four are Dr. Charles Fisch, distinguished professor of medicine; Dr. Suzanne B. Knoebel, Herman C. and Ellnora D. Krannert professor of medicine; Dr. Bill L. Martz, professor of medicine, and Dr. Borys Surawicz, professor of medicine.

DR. GRIFFIN'S GUIDELINES FOR HELPING SEIZURE VICTIMS

Recent reports of people having seizures prompted Acting Dean of Student Affairs Patricia Boaz to seek professional guidelines for helping them. Following is the advice of L.G. Griffin, M.D., IUPUI Student Health Center:

First, remember that most seizures are short-lived and abate within seconds or a few minutes. The head of a seizure victim should be protected and can be done by placing the person prone on the floor or ground. If possible, tongue biting should be prevented by placing a firm (not hard) object between the jaws. Avoid placing your fingers in the victim's mouth. Do not attempt to give seizure victim fluids or medication by mouth, and do not attempt to "stop" the seizure. Attempt only to prevent bodily injury. Some seizure patients lose control of bladder and/or bowels during an attack and helping the person to the restroom after the seizure is appropriate. A person may or may not feel ill following a seizure. If a seizure persists for up to four or five minutes, a visit to a private physician, the Student Health Clinic (Ext. 8216) in Coleman Hall or Wishard's emergency room is recommended. Call a Wishard ambulance at 630-7111. The patient should be advised that transportation is at his/her own expense. Patients may decline this service. In an uncommon situation (medical emergency) where the seizure persists, the victim should be transported to Wishard as quickly as possible. If you need more information, call the Student Health Clinic.


Remind 18-Year-Olds--The two million young men in this country who have 30 days after their 18th birthday to register with Selective Service should be reminded that it's the law to do so.
