INTENSE, INFORMAL RELIGION CONFERENCE OPEN TO ALL

Authors from 14 states will present 25 papers--covering American religious life from the Puritans to the Moonies, and religion in realms political to cultural--during a national public conference this month. "Re-Visioning America: Religion in American Life" will be March 28-30 at the Sheraton Meridian Hotel. It is funded by the Lilly Endowment, Inc., and the Indiana Committee for the Humanities, and sponsored by the Center for American Studies and the Dept. of Religious Studies at IUPUI.



Everyone on campus as well as the general public is invited to attend the concurrent sessions on March 29-30 that will have a moderator, community respondent and academic respondent for each presentation. The conference promises to be intense, but informal and will include public discussions. The sessions will be punctuated with three public lectures:

March 29 at 4:30 p.m -- "Revisionary, Revisionist, or Revisory; or, How Do You Revision an America?" by Giles B. Gunn, professor of English and religion at the U. of Florida at Gainsville;

March 29 at 8:30 p.m. -- "Missions and Millennialism: American Christianity's World Vision" by Timothy L. Smith, professor of history and director of the Program in American Religious History at John Hopkins U.

MEDICINE FOCUSES ON DIABETICS AND ANESTHESIOLOGY

The School of Medicine will host two continuing medical education programs this week, dealing with diabetic microangiopathy (small blood vessel disease) and the other with anesthesiology. 
