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"Genetics, Ethics and Law"

A lecture and panel discussion on "Genetics, Ethics and Law" will feature Dr. Harvey Bender, professor of biology at the University of Notre Dame and adjunct professor of medical genetics at the School of Medicine, at 7:30 p.m. Thursday at the School of Nursing auditorium. The program is open to all who are interested.

After Dr. Bender's presentation, the issue will be discussed by a panel composed of Dr. William Beranek, associate director of the Holcomb Research Institute at Butler University; Dr. Michael Gemignani, chairman of Mathematical Sciences at IUPUI, and Dr. Alan Shusterman, executive director of the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The program is sponsored by the I.U. Medical Center Chapter of The Society of the Sigma Xi, scientific honorary.

Well known in the field of genetics, Dr. Bender is the author or co-author of more than 50 papers published in scientific journals. He has been a visiting professor and consultant to many universities and programs. As an adjunct professor of law at Notre Dame, one of his research areas is biomedical legal ethics.

Says Dr. Bender, ". . .man's technological evolution may have outstripped his biological evolution--however, we should and must be able to replace the blind force of natural selection by conscious direction, based on knowledge of nature and based on our own true values."

Trustees Reaffirm Collegial Model of Governance--On February 7, the I.U. Trustees unanimously passed a resolution which states, in part:

". . .we have concluded that collective bargaining is not an acceptable alternative to the present relationship. . .because(1) collective bargaining does not provide positive benefits to the university, nor to the faculty, and (2) the collegial model of governance is superior to any known alternative, including collective bargaining, for a university like ours. Therefore, we affirm our support of the present system of governance which, we strongly believe, serves the best interest of the university and the constituencies it serves, the faculty, the administration, the students, the alumni and the citizens of the State of Indiana."
