

JAPANESE GIVE GIFTS OF TREES TO HONOR FIVE-YEAR FRIENDSHIP WITH DENITISTRY



There was a tree-planting ceremony recently on campus to honor the 5-1/2 friendship between the Matsumoto Dental College in Japan and the IU School of Dentistry, which began in 1985 as an agreement between the two institutions to promote research and other scholarly activity. A delegation from Japan presented Dean H. William Gilmore with 171 seedlings that include Japanese varieties of buckeye, white birch, mountain cherry, maple and keaki. The remaining trees will be cared for in the IU Bloomington nursery until university landscapers decide on their permanent home. CENTER WILL GROW WITH NEW GRANTS FROM LILLY AND OTHERS

Wise and ethical stewardship of the gifts by the faithful are among economic issues taught to clergy through the national center for Economic Education for the Clergy (EEC) on campus. The center recently announced a new three-year development grant of \$169,000 from Lilly Endowment, Inc. which will be used to expand operations and programs to educate clergy on economic issues that affect their congregations, other institutions, and secular arenas of politics, business and sociology, where the clergy also serve. "Historically, ministers, priests, rabbis and others have had no real

opportunity for education in economics. This grant will help us expand our outreach and develop programs for clergy of all faiths," said Donna K. Dial, president of EEC and associate professor of economics at IUPUI. The new grant is in addition to Lilly Endowment contributions of more than \$18,500. EEC also received a \$10,000 grant from the John Templeton Foundation and another \$5,600 gift from Chevron USA, Inc. The EEC does not accept gifts from any group with religious ties. Assisting Dial is Jerry Donna, vice president and secretary-treasurer of EEC. Dorane Fredland is project director for grants and Rita Hall is administrative secretary. EEC offices are in the Union Building.

NOLITE NOITES PARKING WOES

His office is using all available space to accommodate vehicles, including a 500-space expansion of lots on the east edge of campus adjacent to West Street along California Street, north of Michigan Street, and south of the AO Building. GRANTS TO SUPPORT STUDY OF THE WHY AND HOW OF PHILANTHROPY

The IU Center on Philanthropy at IUPUI has awarded grants of between \$500 and \$5,000 to 44 researchers across the nation in universities, colleges and the philanthropic sector. Their research will relate to fundamental questions about philanthropy, such as why people give time and money; how government, business and non-for-profit sectors interrelate, and what impact religion has. A summary of the researchers' work will become part of a database of national and international scope for use by others studying or teaching about philanthropy. 
DEADLINE TO ORDER IUPUI YEARBOOK IS JUNE 29
