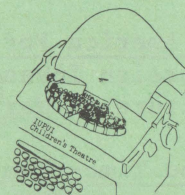
PREMIERS, PLAYS, PUBLISHER AND PLAYWRIGHTS SET FOR SYMPOSIUM

"Becca," the winning play in the IUPUI Theatre-sponsored national playwrighting contest will premier on campus during a children's theatre symposium Mar. 27-28. The play's author Wendy Kesselman, gifted New York playwright, uses dialogue, song and dance, siblings and animals to mix the often scary reality and fantasy of childhood. Tickets for the play, which is recommended for adults and children over seven years old, are available for the 10:30 a.m. performance on Saturday. Tickets are also available for two other children's productions during the symposium. A unique play, "Animal Tales of India" will be performed on Friday at 11 a.m. by Production #1: East-West Fusion Theatre. Then on Saturday, at 2:30 p.m., one of Canada's finest children's play groups, Green Thumb Theatre, will present "Not So Dumb," a play about learning disabilities. Keynote speaker for the symposium is **Suzan Seder**, author of many

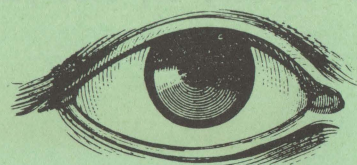

In the U.S. last year, 25,000 people did gain their sight because people thoughtfully pledged their eyes at death. March is National Eye Donor Month, and the Indiana Lions Eye Bank in our Dept. of Ophthalmology, hopes you will consider officially pledging your eyes for use in the oldest form of organ transplant. In considering donating your eyes at death, you should know that there is no charge to you or your family or the recipient, there is no disfigurement in the eye tissue collection and eye donations at death are endorsed by all religions. TRUSTEES GIVE NOD TO BRADY, EVANS AND OTHERS

The approval of U.S. Navy Capt. E. Brady Hancock as chairman of the Dept. of Periodontics, School of Dentistry, was among the many actions taken at the Mar. 7 meeting of the IU trustees. The 20-year Navy man is an internationally known periodontist, dental researcher and clinician. He succeeds Dr. Timothy J. O'Leary, professor of periodontics, who headed the department for 16 years and who was at the school when Dr. Hancock completed his master of science in dentistry degree there in 1974. Approval was also given Dr. Michael A. Evans, a toxicologist who has written extensively on the effects of drug abuse, to become professor of toxicology at the School of Medicine and director of the State Dept. of Toxicology at the Medical Center. He succeeds Dr. Robert B. Forney, distinguished professor of toxicology, who retires Apr. 30. Other approvals include changing the title of James R. Roche, professor of pediatric dentistry, from associate dean for faculty development to associate dean for academic affairs, School of Dentistry. The title of Margaret Pike, associate professor of nursing and associate professor of public and environmental affairs part-time, SPEA, is changed from assistant dean to associate dean for administration, School of Nursing. The title of Joseph F. Kuczkowski, professor of mathematical sciences, is changed from assistant dean to associate dean of academic affairs, School of Science. (Other changes are too numerous to list here.)

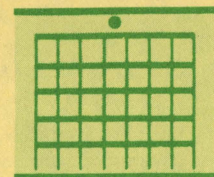
